Heavy Lane Dragons Defeat Miles Golden Bears, 32-14

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.—(SNS)—**MILES ATHLETIC FIELD**—A superior, heavy line of Dragons from Lane College, Jackson, Tenn., unleashed a series of yard-burning attacks and cruised on to a sizzling, back-breaking 32 to 14 win over the heavy-in-spots Miles College Golden Bears here on Miles campus last Saturday afternoon, November 3.

This sensational Dragon win knocked the Golden Bears from the unbeaten ranks after the latter eleven having grabbed two consecutive wins this season.

CLARK 'CHIEF TOUCHDOWNER'
Scoring touchdowns for the Lane Dragons were Left End J. B. Clark (2); and Halfbacks Manque Winters, Hosea Alexander, and Shelly Woodson, one a piece.

J. B. Clark scored his two touchdowns during the first-half period, the first one on a 21-yard gallop to paydirt, and the second as he snagged a toss from Hosea Alexander and motored to TD-territory on a 73-yard dash.

Manque Winters drew first blood in the initial quarter as he marched across the ten-yard mark for paydirt. Center Jimmie Cooke ran across for one of two extra-point conversions. Cooke failed to convert behind Clark's first TD.

Hosea Alexander racked up his lone TD as he bounced over the two-yard line for paydirt. Alexander followed with his conversion for the extra point.

A 23-yard pass from Quarterback Eddie Kyle to Right End Milton Bonds and a 12-yard "first down" ground-splitter by Halfback Shelly Woodson setup Alexander's touchdown.

GOLDEN BEARS THREATEN
Coach T. J. Knox's Golden Bears came to life in the final minutes of the third quarter and marched some 56 yards toward touchdown territory and then lost the ball on downs, lacking only one-yard to complete a fourth first-and-ten. Making up most of the long futile drive for goal were Halfback Warren Williams, former Fairfield Industrial High grid great, who moved the ball seven yards on two plays; Quarterback-Theodore Norman who racked up three more yards; Williams, again, eight more yards, laking a pass from Norman; and two passes from Halfback Willie Brown, the first to Warren Williams for eight yards, and the second shot to Theodore Norman, good for 22 yards. Another pass from Brown to Norman, good nine yards, fell short for first-and-ten.

SPECTACULAR RUN OF GAME
Lane Dragons took over again in the third quarter as Halfback Shelly Woodson took a snap from center and wobbled his way up the field, knocking off tacklers, for some eighty yards and paydirt.

YOW SCORES TWICE FOR MILES
Halfback William Yow put Miles Golden Bears back in the fight in the fourth quarter as he scored twice for the losers, first by taking a pass from William Mixon and scooting some 41 yards to paydirt, and the second by burning the sands for 32 yards across the goal-line. Temporary invalid Halfback William Mixon, Jr. came from the bench, each time, and kicked the extra points for Miles.

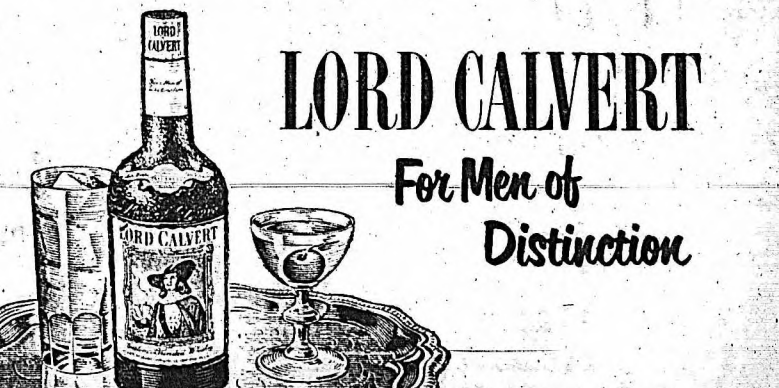
