Along The Sports Trail

The major league All-Stars showed some 5,200 fans the brand of baseball as played a major league Sunday when they outslugged the Negro American League All-Stars 11-1 at Martin Stadium, as Brooks Lawrence of the Cincinnati Redlegs and Sam Jones of the Chicago Cubs, practically handcuffed the Negro American League boys.

Brooks Lawrence hurled the first five innings allowing five hits, all singles, as he kept the Bob Boyd boys in check. He was never in danger of being scored on as he showed a variety of sharp curves and fast balls. He gave up two hits in the second as Bob Boyd led off with a single. Jim Robinson fled to right. Charles Jennings singled to center. Boyd stopping at second, as Willie Mays fielded the ball. John Kennedy promptly hit into a double play. Baker to Thompson to Crowe.

In the third, Jesse Mitchell led off with a single but was out attempting to steal, and was thrown out by Elston Howard to Thompson. Ace

Robinson popped to Baker at short, Lonnie Harris beat out a slow roller between Lawrence and Al Smith at third, for a hit, but Charlie Pride forced Harris. Mitchell got the last bit off Lawrence in the fifth with two outs and was out at second in trying to stretch it into a double. Lawrence fanned four and gave up no walks.

Sam Jones worked the last four innings allowing two hits and one unearned run. He fanned five and issued on bases on balls. In the seventh Eugene Elliott led off with a double, but Boyd fouled out to Jim Pendleton, who had taken over a third as Al Smith went to center and Willie Mays taking over at second base. Robinson fanned and Jennings was an easy infield out.

The lone score of the Negro American Leaguers came in the 8th when Pendleton fumbled Kennedy's grounder and then threw wild to first with Kennedy going to second. Mitchell doubled down the right field line scoring Kennedy. Jones then fanned Ollie Brantley, Lonnie Harris and Bill Wyatt in succession.

Ace Robinson hurled good ball against the major leaguers for six innings although touched for ten hits good for only three runs, the first two coming home on a prodigious home run far over the left field wall by Willie Mays in the third, and the other on a sacrifice fly by Hank Aaron in the fourth.

In the sixth the roof caved in on Robinson as eleven men went to bat with six hits good for six runs, although one of the runs was charged to Ollie Brantley who relieved Robinson with the bases full. In this big inning, Gene Baker led off with a double. Irvin fled to centerfield. Sam Jones belted a home run over the center field wall for two runs.

Al Smith doubled for his third hit of the game. Pendleton walked. Mays singled to left with Smith stopping at third. Brantley relieved Robinson and was greeted by a line drive triple down the right field line clearing the bases.

Tenn. State Meets Maryland State In Capital Classic

WASHINGTON — The CIAA champion Maryland State College

Howard singled Aaron home for the final run of the inning.

It was a great exhibition of major league baseball with the major leaguers delighting the crowd with their heavy hitting and spectacular fielding. All of the major leaguers got at least one hit, with the exception of Pendleton, who did not go to the bat officially, getting two base-on-balls.

Leadoff man Al Smith, led the hitters with four for six times at bat, including a double. Baker was three for six, including two doubles; Mays was two for five including two-run homers; Jones had one for two which was a homer and Aaron, the leading hitter in the National League had one for five, a three run triple and sacrifice fly, driving in four runs.

In the first innings Mays and Aaron worked a double steal with two outs. Mays taking third and Aaron going to second Howard was intentionally passed to get to George Crowe, who obliged by popping up in front of the plate for the third out. Again in the fourth and sixth innings, Howard was passed with men on second and third and Crowe ended the threat.

The Negro American Leaguers collected seven hits with Jesse Mitchell getting three, including a double; Elliott collected a double while Boyd, Lonnie Harris and Jennings connected for singles. Boyd singled sharply through the middle in the second, and went out on a line drive to Monte Irvin in left field in the fifth.

Old time Negro American League players served as coaches for the Boyd team, Larry Brown and Nat Rogers, both top players in their playing days.

The players of both teams were introduced to the crowd and lined up along the first base and third base sides of the diamond, each received a big ovation as they took their places. Mr. William Little, a Chicago business man, representing the league president, Dr. J. B. Martin, pitched the first ball. The Memphis All-Star Band, under the direction of J. A. McDaniels played the National Anthem.

Hawks and the rejuvenated Tennessee State University Tigers will clash here Saturday, October 27, in what looms as the biggest inter-sectional contest of the current football season.

Background for the titanic tussle between these two gridiron rivals will be the 15th annual Capital Classic and the scene Griffith Stadium where more than 25,000 are expected for the football festival. To date, the Hawks have clobbered Hampton 34-0 and whipped Virginia State, 10-7.

On the other hand, Tennessee, inspired by their new coach, Howard Gentry, surprised mighty Langston, 46-7, and appears well on its way to another victorious campaign. Thus, a hectic struggle is anticipated at classic time on October 27.

Maryland is sparked by two sensational runners who are already getting All-American consideration. Johnny Samples and Lanny Butler, halfbacks, while Hal Cooper, 210-pound, 6-foot-3 tackle, is a bulwark in the line.

Tennessee puts a great deal of reliance in the Tigers' touchdown twins, Pecky Hines and Memphis-born Jesse Willum. This pair stole the spotlight in the Tiger's romp over Langston.

'Bolts Dump Devils And Move Closer To Prep Grid Title

MELROSE HOMECOMING GAME SLATED THURS.

The prep league title picture became a little clearer for undefeated St. Augustine as the Bolts passed their third acid test by methodically wasting away the Douglass Red Devils 28-7 Friday night at Melrose Stadium. In the same arena Thursday night the Hamilton Wildcats gained undisputed possession of the cellar by bowing to the Manassas Tigers 28-14.

Hamilton got the lead first against Manassas but so did the Wildcats hold the upper hand in their past setbacks. This contest was to be no difference as the Wildcats quickly chalked up a safety and when Richard Jones went 15 yards for a touchdown Hamilton held an 8-0 first quarter margin.

The safety came on one of the weirdest plays you'll see in sometime. Halfback Billy Phillips attempted to punt from the Manassas 10 and kicked the ball backward over his head and out of the end zone for an automatic safety.

Manassas got back in the game in the next period to knot the score at eight all at halftime. End Marvin Doggett, who prior to this game has caught passes to the 12 points registered by the Tigers in prep play, received a 30 yard pitch from Melvin Brown and galloped 30 more for the score. The point after was missed as were three efforts which followed. Manassas got credit for the safety when the Hamilton punter had to reach high for a snap back and stepped out of the end zone.

Neil tailed first in the third period to give Hamilton a short-lived advantage. Speedy Robert Gentry broke through the line and raced 31 yards untouched for one of two TD's garnered by Manassas in the third stanza. The Tigers led the contest away late in the final period when Gentry ran a stray Hamilton pass back to the Wildcats 18 After working the pigskin down to the one yard line fullback Allan Curtis slipped through for the score.

Quarterback Grant Ward uncoiled two touchdown heaves in each of the first two quarters to almost eliminate the Douglass Red Devils from championship contention. St. Augustine will have to get past only Hamilton and Manassas to wrap up the title. Manassas seem to be the only threat on the strength of their two fine broken field runners.

Ward found the range with end Tom Donaldson for a 18 yard scoring aerial. Just before the half Ward found Steve Boone all by his lonesome down the middle tagging

about 20 yards away from scrimmage. Boone zig zagged the remaining 20 yards to paydirt. Willie Denton added the conversion after the first score.

Douglass, who threw away early chances to score after the butterfingers Bolts were plagued with fumblelets, made their last move in fourth period when Larry Squalls knifed over from the one. Ivory Hunt took a pass for the point.

St. Augustine erased any doubts from the minds of its partisans by taking the ensuing kickoff and marching to the Douglass pay-off domain. Johnny Jones churned over from the four. Willie Garrett ramblod over for the point.

Melrose and Washington off for a week gets back into action this week. The Golden Wildcats will celebrate their homecoming against Carver of Tupelo, Miss. at Melrose Thursday night.

Washington locks up with winless Hamilton Friday night at Washington Stadium. The Warriors are all even after two prep leagues outings.
