Wins Agreement To Have Film Of Tour Sent To U. S.

By ERNEST BARCELLA LENINGRAD, U.S.S.R. (UPI) - Vice Premier Richard M. Nixon and his party got a "runaround" from Soviet officials Monday to prevent them from seeing the power plant of Russia's atomic icebreaker.

Insect Powder Suspected In Second Death

FLORIDA CITY, Fla. - (UPI) - A second fatality within two months prompted Dade County health authorities and newspapers on July 23 to urge cautious use of an insect powder derived from a deadly nerve gas developed by Nazi Germany in World War II.

But Nixon finally pressured the officials into letting Vice Admiral Hyman G. Rickover see the ship's reactors. It was the first such incident on Nixon's "peace and friendship" tour of the Soviet Union and occurred after he arrived to a noisy welcome by Soviet TU104 jetliner from Moscow.

Housing Situation Cited As No. 1 Human Relations Woe

VALPARAISO, Ind. - "One of the most basic problems connected with race relations is the housing situation." Rev. Ralph Moeller said in an essay, the last of six, at a Valparaiso University human relations workshop.

He urged individuals to study the housing conditions in their vicinity and be aware of the problems, to form Negro-white committees from churches for study and work on the problem, and to refrain from joining "restrictive gentlemen's agreements" or otherwise take advantage of racial prejudice for their own financial advantage.

Most Southerners prefer several things to segregation - money, law and order, and maintenance of their reputation for good manners - and these things are bringing indirect pressure on Southerners to accept integration.

Segregation Will Lose To Personal Values--Says Zinn

Writing in the August issue of Harper's Magazine, Dr. Zinn says: "Any pollster, any white Southerner, or any Negro will tell you that white Southerners are overwhelmingly for segregation if the question is put to them in isolation."

1. Money. The power of the boycott, directed against the bus companies in Montgomery, and the white tradesmen of Tuskegee, "needs no elaboration." Also, a white plumbing contractor will hire a Negro helper and sit beside him on the front seat of his truck rather than hire a white helper and pay ten dollars more per week.

2. Law and order. Even in the most flagrant cases of violent opposition to integration - Little Rock, Clinton, the Nashville school dynamiting, the Aultherne Lucy affair - only a small minority of Southerners has preferred violence to quiet if unhappy acceptance.

PLASTIC BAG WARNING IN 'INFANT CARE'

WASHINGTON - A special warning to new parents about the dangers of plastic bags to their babies is being inserted into copies of "Infant Care," the Government's best-selling publication, the Children's Bureau announced July 23.

The U. S. Government Printing Office has agreed to insert the notice into all copies of "Infant Care" it sells. Senators and Congressmen, many of whom distributed the publication to parents in their States and districts, are being requested to stuff the warning about the dangers of plastic film into copies they send out.

The Children's Bureau notice cautions parents not to use the plastic to protect their baby's bedding or to leave it where the baby can play with it. They are urged to destroy garment or vegetable bags when they have served their purpose and not let any kind of plastic film come into physical contact with young children.

You are urged to exercise every precaution with this new plastic. As soon as a garment or vegetable bag of this material has served its purpose, it should be destroyed. Do not use the bag for any purpose that would allow your young child to come into physical contact with it.
