involved in getting the approval of the board of adjustment and a rising interest rate, the financial institution that had agreed to back Mr. Katz's operation backed out. This caused him to have to shelve his plans for the apartment complex. Shortly after this time,

Mr. Katz was appointed to the Governmental Co-ordinating Committee for Housing. After serving on this committee for several months he realized the desperate need for housing for low-income people in Memphis and particularly in the area where his property was located. Upon consultation with the Housing Authority, Mr. Katz was told of the Authority's plan to lease new or existing housing from private developers and use it for public housing. He was told the apartments would have to be built according to specifications outlined by the Department of Housing and Urban Development because of a federal plan to replace housing with housing in blighted areas and the desperate need for low-income housing. Mr. Katz made the decision to build a leased Public Housing Development.

After he had his preliminary plans drawn, he set out to have the zoning changed to R-4, a requirement of this type construction, this meant a hearing before the Planning Commission and the City Council. Both of these bodies approved the change and ordinarily all that would have remained for him to do would be to obtain a building permit. This was not the case. Since the zoning had been changed,

ed, he had to go back before the Board of Adjustment for another variation approval.

After this was accomplished, he received a "Letter of Intent" from the Housing Authority. With the "Letter of Intent" in hand, he set out to get financial backing for the project. The Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company of Milwaukee agreed to handle the permanent financing, with the First National Bank of Memphis handling the temporary financing, with the First National Bank of Memphis financing. On February 20th Mr. Katz purchased his building permits and made his final plans to get construction under way.

The development will be composed of multi-unit buildings with living units constructed as townhouses. The brick-veneer building will feature the latest construction methods, and will be built around a central courtyard that will serve as playground space for the youngsters. The units will have from one to six bedrooms to accommodate several different sizes of families.

standards.
2. Course information from each school will be made available through the home school's registrar librarian and chairman of departments. A general statement on the consortium arrangement will appear in each catalog.

3. Faculty exchange, joint visiting and inter-campus visit are encouraged. Each transaction will be negotiated on its own merits.

4. The benefits of coordinating some existing programs and of cooperative planning of complementary specializations are recognized.

5. To facilitate the above agreements, we will:
a) Appoint a deputy from each school to meet as needed for planning and coordinating consortium activity.

b) Encourage meetings of the heads of parallel department faculty meetings.

c) Plan a future common calendar, Sigma and Christian Brothers College will investigate the possibility of adopting the 4-1-4 calendar of LeMoyne-Owen.

Nat'l Teacher Exam At L-O

National Teacher Examinations will be given at LeMoyne-Owen College on April 4. It was announced by Dr. Lionel A. Arnold, academic dean of the College.

Student and in-service teachers planning to take the tests must fill out registration forms which are to be forwarded to the Educational Testing Service in Princeton, New Jersey by March 12.

Bulletin of information describing registration procedures and containing registration forms may be obtained from Dr. Arnold or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service Box 911, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.

At the one-day session a candidate may take the common Examinations, which includes tests in Professional Education and General Education, and one of the seventeen Teaching area Examinations which are designed to evaluate his understanding of the subject matter and methods applicable to the area he may be assigned to teach.

Each candidate will receive an admission ticket advising him of the exact location of the center to which he should report. Dean Arnold advised, Candidates for the common Ex-

aminations will report at 8:30 on April 4 and should finish at approximately 12:30. Dean Arnold said. The Teaching Area Examinations will begin at 1:30 and should finish at approximately 4:15, according to the examinations' time schedule which has been set up by Educational Testing Service.
