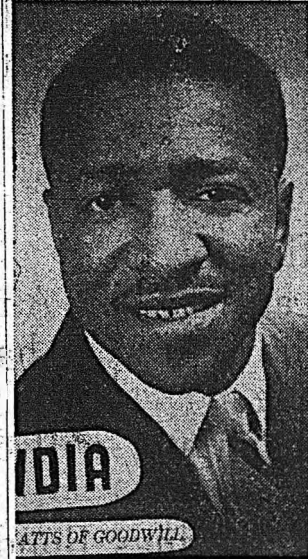

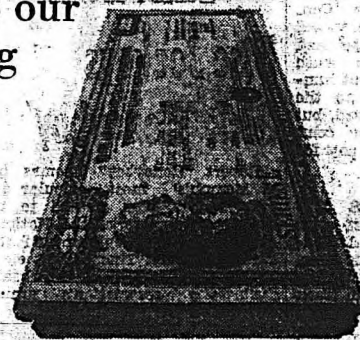

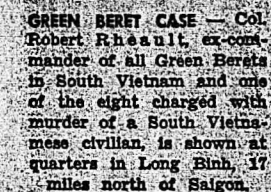

CUBA, USA CONFER ON HIJACKING MATTERS

WASHINGTON — (UPI) The United States has been quietly conferring with Cu about the persistent airliner hijacking problem, but so far with limited success, the State Department disclosed Saturday.

The approach to the Communist Havana government, with which Washington has had no diplomatic relations since January 1961, are part of a broad U. S. attempt to arouse the international community's interest in combatting the practice.

The United States also is proposing an international agreement which would require hijackers to be returned to countries of origin despite any claim of the right to political asylum.

Even as the State Department reported on the situation, an Air Force airliner with 26 persons aboard was diverted from its flight between Bucaramanga and Bogota, Colombia, and forced to fly to Cuba.

It was the 39th commercial airliner hijacking to Cuba this year. All but 15 of them being American planes.

The United States has been most troubled by the diversion of commercial flights to Cuba.

Official estimate that since 1961, about 3,000 passengers have been hijacked to Cuba and that attempts continue at a rate of about four a month.

Concurrent with an upsurge in the end of 1968 and the beginning of 1969, U. S. officials said, the United States contacted the Cubans through Switzerland, which has represented U. S. interests in Cuba since diplomatic relations with the Fidel Castro government were severed.

RESULTS SO FAR
Cuba has agreed to permit hijacked aircraft to return to the United States with all its passengers agree to accept complete responsibility for passenger safety.

The United States has furnished Cuba with lists of persons considered potential hijackers. Cuba has indicated that a limited number of such persons may be allowed into Cuba via Mexico.

The United States has suggested that dissident Cubans living in the United States might return to Cuba on empty aircraft of the refugee airlift flying to Havana. Months ago, Cuba and the United States agreed that "airlift would fly unhappy Cubans to the United States, but so far Havana has refused to admit anyone on the return flights.

The United States has proposed a bilateral agreement with Cuba for the return of hijackers to U. S. custody. Cuba has indicated that at the moment it has no interest in such a pact.

And Now, Justice Haynesworth

AN EDITORIAL
The appointment of U. S. Judge Clement Haynesworth to the Supreme Court bench will definitely show the Nixon trend to somewhat change a new direction for the court. Judge Haynesworth, from the state of South Carolina and from the 4th District Appellate court would suggest a new direction for seeking appointees.
Chief Justice Warren Berger, originally from the state of Minnesota is a far western breed. While he has been classed as a middle of the reader, his record would say that he could either be classed as centered or a little left of center.
Now Justice Haynesworth from the deep South state of South Carolina, could be a puzzle to those who are quick to jump at a conclusion based purely of section.
It will be recalled that a few years ago there was appointed to the bench, Atty. Hugo Black, who was at that time, U. S. Senator Black from Alabama. He was styled in the case of Haynesworth, an ordinary attorney. Masses of protest, especially from the civil rights sector poured thick and fast against him. But it must be said that his appointment and his actions brought a fresh breeze of civil rights, unexpected to the court. He has been a mighty power on the bench for liberalism and now enjoys the approval of many who at first referred to him as having been a member of the Ku Klux Klan.
Both men had a geographical origin in which racism had long seen service in political campaigns. Under such conditions, it has been shown that once a man is freed from the political clutches that held him fast, he will be free to show just who he himself is.
Remember it was once said of Jesus — "Can any clean thing come out of Nazareth?"
Give the new appointee a chance to prove his steel. He might be the personage for whom the country is waiting.

4 Persons Killed During Weekend

Platitudinal Declarations

Young Attorney Maynard Jackson, first person to declare his candidacy for vice mayor, had the political pond in this particular spot, all to himself, for a long time. Last week, the second person entered the pond.
City Alderman Milton Farris declared his candidacy for the vice mayor's seat Aug. 21. This would be considered rather late in some quarters. But Farris has been mentioned very frequently as a possible mayoralty.
Either he does desire to be Mayor of Atlanta at this time ... or he feels that Atlanta does not want him as a mayor ... that is he doesn't feel he is politically strong enough to obtain a winning number of votes. So he picks out a "soft spot."
On announcing his intention Farris said "Atlanta can ill-afford to provide on the job training this vital office vice mayor) for any man who has never set foot inside the aldermanic chambers."
It is very obvious that Farris leveled this slap at Maynard Jackson. While Farris has served 18 years as a city alderman, he has not been vice mayor therefore he does not have any training as vice mayor.
Farris is accredited with declaring further: "Without a strong, experience vice mayor our whole forward momentum might wallow hopelessly, mired in the morass of political consideration. Atlanta must have strong experienced and skilled man at the helm of the aldermanic board. Our city can afford no less."
Taking the alderman's words at face value and applying the criteria he has established, he does not qualify to run for Vice Mayor. He disqualifies himself by the critique he directed to Atoty. Maynard Jackson.
After slapping his only opponent who is the first Negro to seek the vice mayorship of Atlanta, Farris nobly pledged to work to solve the problems of transportation, crime lack of revenue, and housing. If he is sincere about this pledge wouldn't he be in a better position to carry out his pledge as a city alderman? A few paragraphs before his pledge he indicated that the aldermanic board is the governing authority of the city.
The alderman's statements are in direct conflict.
Farris went on to talk about being vigilant, dark forces, bigotry, hate, evil poisons and life of this great and growing city. He also added some other statements

Education And Social Reformation

Letter to the editor
There are widespread discussions on the relevancy and irrelevancy of our educational efforts. These discussions have become more than rhetoric on the part of the people to whom the discussions are directed. Since there were no efforts to avoid these confrontations, school officials are taking reactionary measures. This was done only when they were forced to make decisions. Until now, their jobs have been mere formalities.
Presidents of Negro institutions in a three day conference contended that governmental officials do not understand their problems. Could this be true, when they structured the system with which they operate? Why did they wait until legislation was being passed that would affect them directly, before suggesting that legislation was not in their best interest?
Health, Education, and Welfare official James Farmer, said "Black schools are relevant and needed more than ever." We can agree that they are needed, and were always needed, but there are questions of their relevancy.
The roots of the problems are not necessarily on the school campuses, but the vehicle for change must take place in an academic environment. His does entail a school that is relevant to the needs of the people. This in itself suggests an imaginative, sensitive, and responsive administrator.
Most of these schools are more than a hundred years old. They should not encounter the problems of Federal City College, in its first year. Though there are not excuses, they have allotted a fifth of their staff for "Black Studies."
No one has reasonably defined what constitutes a "Black Studies" program. Then how relevant is a program that is going amiss? It doesn't matter what course a person is teaching if the student asks if all men are created equal, the answer is yes. If he ask if all men are treated equal, even in America the answer is no.
Most, if not all Negro schools are college preparatory. Furthermore, the students are trained to be teachers, only to go back to teach students who do not want to be teachers, but they can give him no other choice. This is obviously a cyclic process, whose relevancy is questionable.
The governmental official must know the problem. They are representatives of the established system that created it, perpetuated it and rewarded it. The schools are only an extension of the system into the Negro community.
Even in urban areas, the Negro graduate who attend college is usually less than 50 per cent, not to mention those that do no graduate. It is deplorable to mention that in some small towns and rural areas, high school graduates who attend college approaches zero.
Whether the Negro schools know it or not, the training programs are in essence a substitute for what they were suppose to have done.

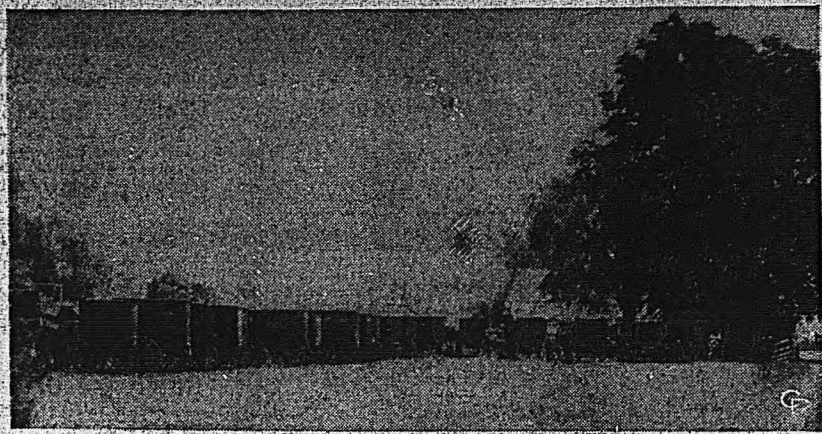

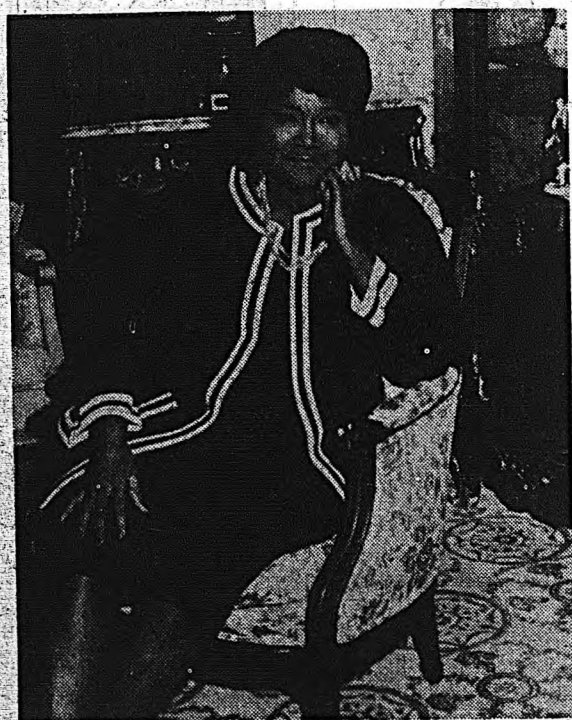

Light On Darkness In Ghana Africa

 GHANA, West Africa — An old age of classical history once said "there is always something new coming out of Africa." In some ways that observation is probably as true today as it was in days of old Ghana, as a nation, is very much a part of modern Africa. And as such, it is one of the clearest examples of something that is new and exciting that is "coming out of Africa."

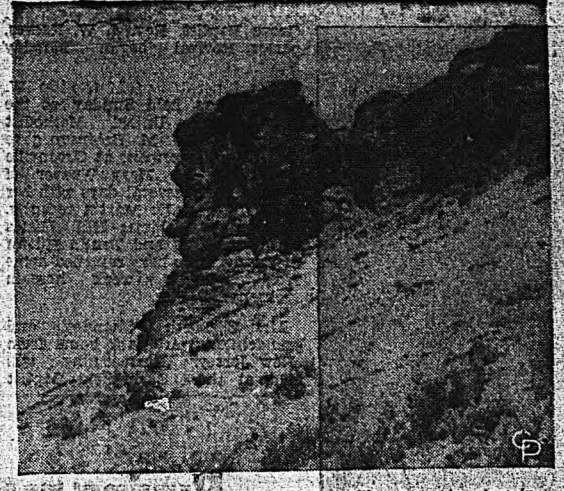
Despite the internal political upheaval of three years ago, resulting in the fall of its once revered leader, Kwame Nkrumah, Ghana still bristles with the possibility of becoming a great nation. In 1957, Ghana became the first state in Black Africa to gain political independence from European powers.

This land had been a British protectorate or colony since the 1970's. At the time of independence, Ghana showed great promise of becoming the guiding light of Black African political independence. It had a sound economy, although one crop country (cocoa), as are most newly independent nations. It had an educated elite. It had a popular charismatic leader. Its borders contained a lovely people. It was an inspiration to millions of politically conscious Americans of African descent.

But birth-pangs and growing pains impeded Ghana's progress. Kwame Nkrumah, as enlightened as he is felt victim of a fate reserved for the visionary mind. His reach exceeded his grasp.

Nkrumah's scope and understanding of the outside world, his unrestrained compulsion and sincere commitment to make Africa a part of the international power arrangement, brought about his downfall.

Nkrumah's focus on external realities, especially in the area of economics brought about a wave of

NET Focus On 'Apartheid' In S. Africa On August 25th

For the first time of national television, black Americans will offer their insight into South African apartheid on NET's "Black Journal," Monday, Aug. 25.

The program will focus primarily on current resistance efforts within South Africa, ranging from gradualism to guerrilla warfare, and on the plight of South African blacks as compared with the lives of black Americans. It will utilize films and still photographs, poetry reading and a panel discussion.

Panelists will include Charles Hamilton, professor of political science at Columbia University and co-author (with Stokely Carmichael) of "Black Power," Peter Moloisi, an allied South African who is U. S. representative, Pan African writer, who will read his poetry during another portion of the program; Blyden Jackson, economic expert for the African Fund; and Hoga Belingo, an exile from South West Africa, who will assess South Africa's influence on neighboring nations.

"Black Journal" will also present three contrasting visual views of South Africa — through the photos of Ernest Cole, a South African photo-journalist, whose recent work is the book "House of Bondage," through a film distributed by the South African Tourist Agency; and through footage from NET's 1965 film "South African Essay."

When this nation gained its political independence, it changed its name from the Gold Coast (and the stigma of colonialism and slavery) to Ghana, the ancient and proud Kingdom of the West African Sudan dating back to the third century A. D. It is a name befitting the spirit and aspirations of a modern African people whose rugged yet soft and resilient approach to life calls that of the ancient Ghanaians.

Ghana at this moment is one the brink of taking a giant step towards creative growth or patented stagnation. To move forward always means to face danger, but true creativity is always on the other side of danger.

At his time, one can only hope with the greatest sincerity that Ghana reaches her deserved fulfillment.

At the risk of seeing partisan, this writer chooses to believe in one of the slogans used by a party in the current political campaign going on in Ghana. "Progress—the confident speaker asks, and his enthusiastic supporters respond: "Sure! Sure! Sure!"

Lt. Gov. Wants People To Elect Governor

UPI — Lt. Gov. George T. Smith said Thursday that "the people should select who they want to succeed to the governor's chair."

Smith disagreed with a recommendation of a Constitution Revision Commission committee that the governor should have a lieutenant governor of his own choice.

Smith said that "last year the General Assembly and the people adopted an amendment which said they never did want the General Assembly to select their governor again."

"If they adopt this proposal," Smith added, "not even the General Assembly would vote for who they wanted for lieutenant governor."

"It would be done by the governor himself."

The committee had voted unanimously to recommend that being in 1974 candidates nominated for governor would pick up their running mates.

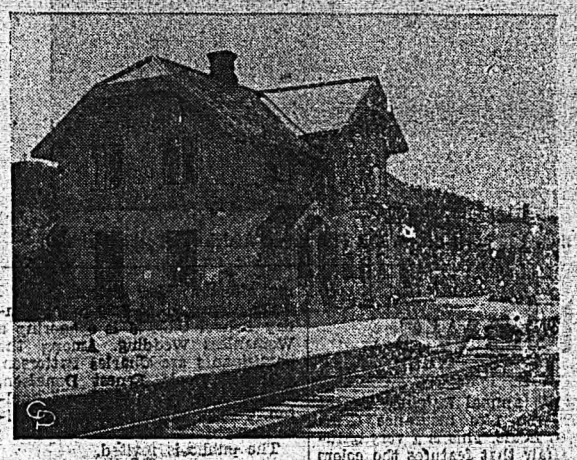
The proposal also would bar the lieutenant governor from serving as president of the Senate as he now does and make him in effect an assistant governor.

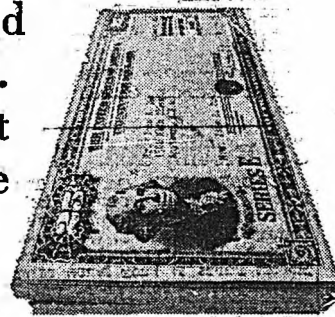

DIXIE REPORT

WASHINGTON — (UPI)—The top school desegregation officer in the federal government had denied the South is being forced to close all-black schools this fall to meet integration standards.

Leon E. Panetta, head of civil rights enforcement in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, said that Southern school officials could have used other, less drastic, options.

Increasingly, Southern foes of the federal desegregation policies are centering their protests against the school closing where once the reason for outcries was the long distance busing of pupils.

The stubborn fact causing this controversy is that the free voluntary transfer method of desegregation used in most of the South has not brought any white pupils into many of the Negro schools lying deep in black neighborhoods.

To meet HEW's goal of completing integration of most Southern school systems this fall, local officials have the option of closing the school and busing the Negroes out.

MANY ARE CLOSED
 Dozens of the all black schools many of them new or only a few years old, and representing substantial tax outlays are being closed as schools and converted to other community uses.

Panetta told UPI the department's policy is to advocate use of all adequate facilities and prefers that local officials desegregate a school by whatever means, instead of closing it.

But the Southerners claim freeing all pupils to transfer voluntarily meets legal requirements and HEW in effect is forcing them to close the schools.

Rep. William L. Dickinson R-Ala., said last week that in his state,

where the entire school desegregation program is under court supervision, HEW attorney are responsible in some cases.

Dickson said the attorneys suggested the school closing to the federal courts, and the courts promptly included the school closings in their orders.

HEW officials said they had no easily obtainable figures in prospect for the South. But Dickson claimed there are "millions of dollars' worth" in his state alone.

ATLANTA MEETING
 Georgia Gov. Lester G. Maddox placed the subject on a complaint list discussed at a regional meeting he held 10 days ago for governors, congressmen and school officials.

Maddox Mississippi Gov. John Bell Williams and others at the sparsely attended session called on President Nixon to bring this HEW "social experiment" to a halt.

"We can't afford to stand by and see our children sacrificed on the altar of political expediency," Williams said.

HOUSE AMENDMENT
 Nixon and HEW officials remained silent recently when the House, by a vote margin, amended a school aid bill to outlaw using federal funds to force busing and "abolishment of any school." The amendment before the Senate for a test later.

At about the time the Maddox Group and an organization of Nixon, the House Democratic Study Group, an organization of liberal Democrats, was drafting a protest letter of its own.

The administration's silence, the group wrote Nixon "may have the death warrant for the federal school desegregation program." It claimed a word from Nixon would have defeated the amendment in the House.

Student Religious Conference Slated By Christian Scientist

Constructive social change will be the theme of one of the largest international religious conferences for college students held this year.

"Building in a Revolutionary Period" is the topic for the biennial meeting of Christian Science college organizations scheduled Aug. 28-30 at the denomination's headquarters in Boston. More than 5,000 students will assemble for the three-day conference.

Chartered buses, planes, and group flights have been arranged by many of the students coming from distant points, including England, Germany and Australia.

Previous conferences have also drawn students from countries of Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia and Latin America. 1,130 colleges and universities of 31 nations will be

represented. The conference will stress the need for a realistic implementing of ideas that have developed. Sub-topics for the 1969 meeting have come from a set of resolutions adopted at the 1967 meeting.

Panels, workshops, seminars and plenary sessions to consider such topics as campus and community tension, racial conflict, the drug and stimulant problem, marriage and birth control, morality, conscientious objection to military service, social action and healing will be held.

Christian Scientists stress the dynamic relevance of prayer. From many angles the question will be asked, "Does God make a difference in the social arena as well as in the personal experience."

Most of those attending will be members of Christian Science Organizations that have sprung up under student leadership on some 500 college and university campuses since the beginning of this century, plus several hundred informal groups.

Among the guest speakers will be Erwin D. Canham, editor in chief of The Christian Science Monitor and Lord Gore-Booth, recently retired as Head of Her Majesty's Diplomatic Service (top permanent official of the British Foreign Office).

During the conference period, dormitories are being made available to attending students by colleges in the Boston area.

Legionnaires Hear Report On Sexual Abuses Of Children

ATLANTA — (UPI)—The popular belief that sexual assaults on children are perpetrated by strangers lurking on playgrounds is mythical the National Child Welfare Commission of the American Legion was told Friday, the opening day of the organization's week-long 51st national convention.

Vincent DeFrancis, director of the American Humane Association's children's division, told the commission that a three year study on sexual abuses of children showed 75 per cent of the cases involve persons known to the child or their relatives.

The attacks are usually the result of lack of parental care he said and occur "at all levels among the country club set as well as in the ghetto."

DeFrancis called for the establishment of a system of protective agencies to save the children, who are usually young girls, from the "excruciating, traumatic process" of having to answer detailed questions for the police interrogators after the case has been reported.

"It would be better to let the offender go without prosecution than accurately damage the child for the rest of her life," he said.

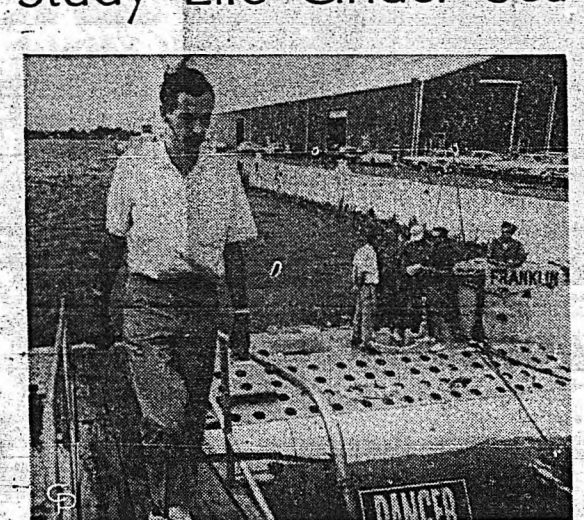

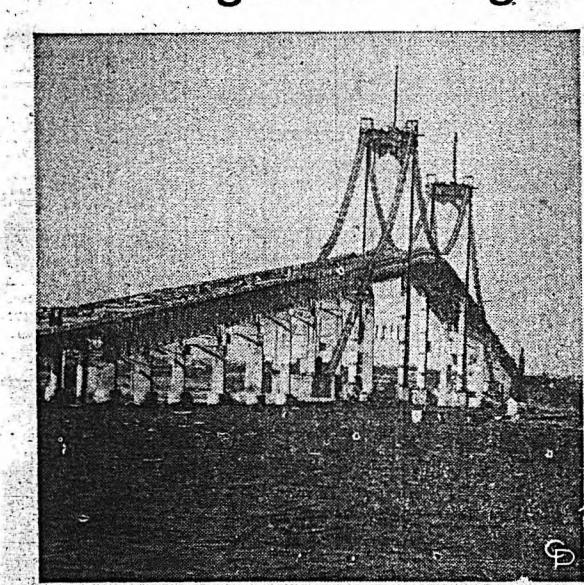
