## Spanish Club Elects Officers

At the March meeting, it was voted to reorganize the club into an organization by invitation only. This re-organization is a preliminary step toward the establishment of a chapter of a national Spanish honorary fraternity on Southwestern's campus. Invitations will be issued at the end of this year. Those who make an "A" in first year Spanish, a "B" in second year, or who are enrolled in advanced Spanish are eligible for membership.

For its final two meetings, the Spanish Club plans to have a banquet at Pancho's and a breakfast one morning before school at one of the sorority houses. All Spanish students are invited to both meetings.

## Federation Needs Camp Counselors

Despite the fewer job opportunities predicted for college students and graduates this summer, there will be more openings for camp counselors in 49 nonsectarian and Protestant camps affiliated with the Federation of Protestant Welfare Agencies, New York City.

Because of the severe personnel shortage that has jeopardized many camping programs for deprived youngsters, the federation has launched a more intensive drive to recruit applicants as far west as Missouri and Illinois for summer work in New York, New Jersey, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania and Connecticut.

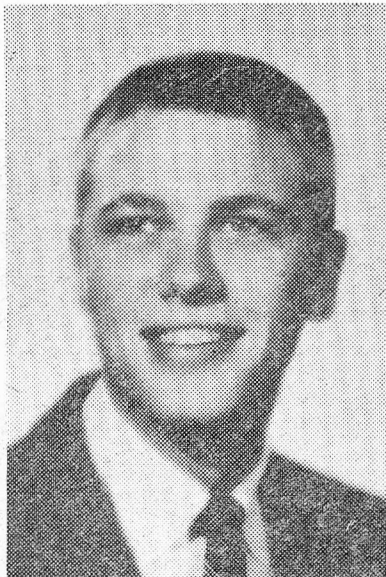

## UN and Peace Topic Of Discussion Group

"Can the UN keep peace?" was the topic of the last world issues Student Council discussion group Thursday night. Gunnar Klinke served as leader for the discussion.

The group decided that the purpose of the UN is not to be a world government but rather to bring together the nations of the world to discuss and face world problems. It has in fact helped to meet many situations. The area in which greatest cooperation among all powers has come into play is that of such sub-organizations as the World Health Organization, the Food and Agricultural Organization, and UNESCO. These and other such groups, as Gunnar pointed out, "make war on famine, illiteracy and the like." This is a great help to underdeveloped countries and, it might be added, a block to communism in such areas.

The UN has fought to block aggression, too. Gunnar pointed out that the UN has intervened in Iran, Korea, and Suez. Nothing was done about Hungary as far as fighting was concerned, but because of the strong condemnation

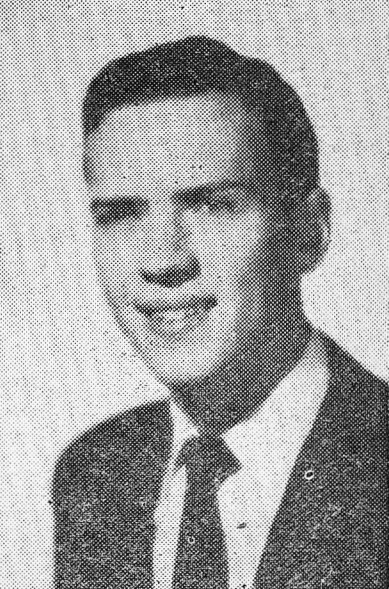
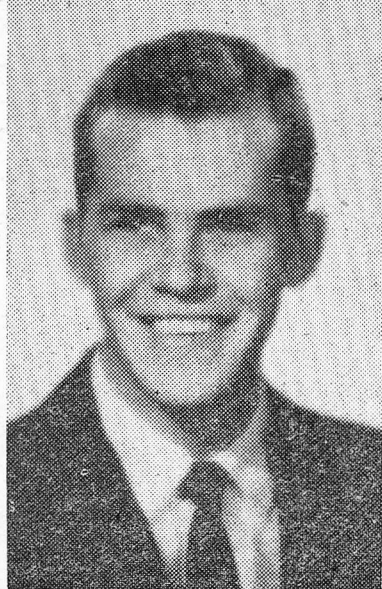
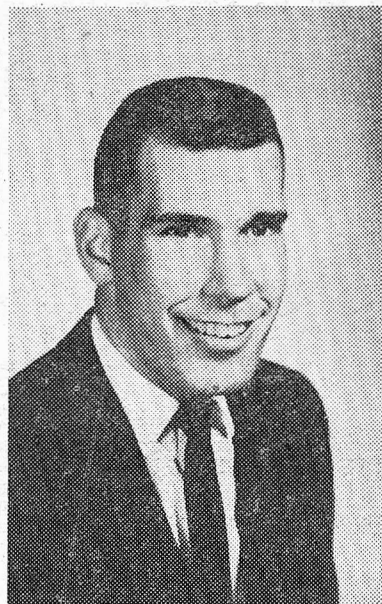
J. L. is this year's editor of the Lynx annual. He was president of his sophomore class, has played football for three years and is president of his dorm. J. L. is also a member of ODK.

Tuesday, Cody announced that this was the last regular meeting of this year's Council, although its members will meet next Tuesday with the incoming Council.

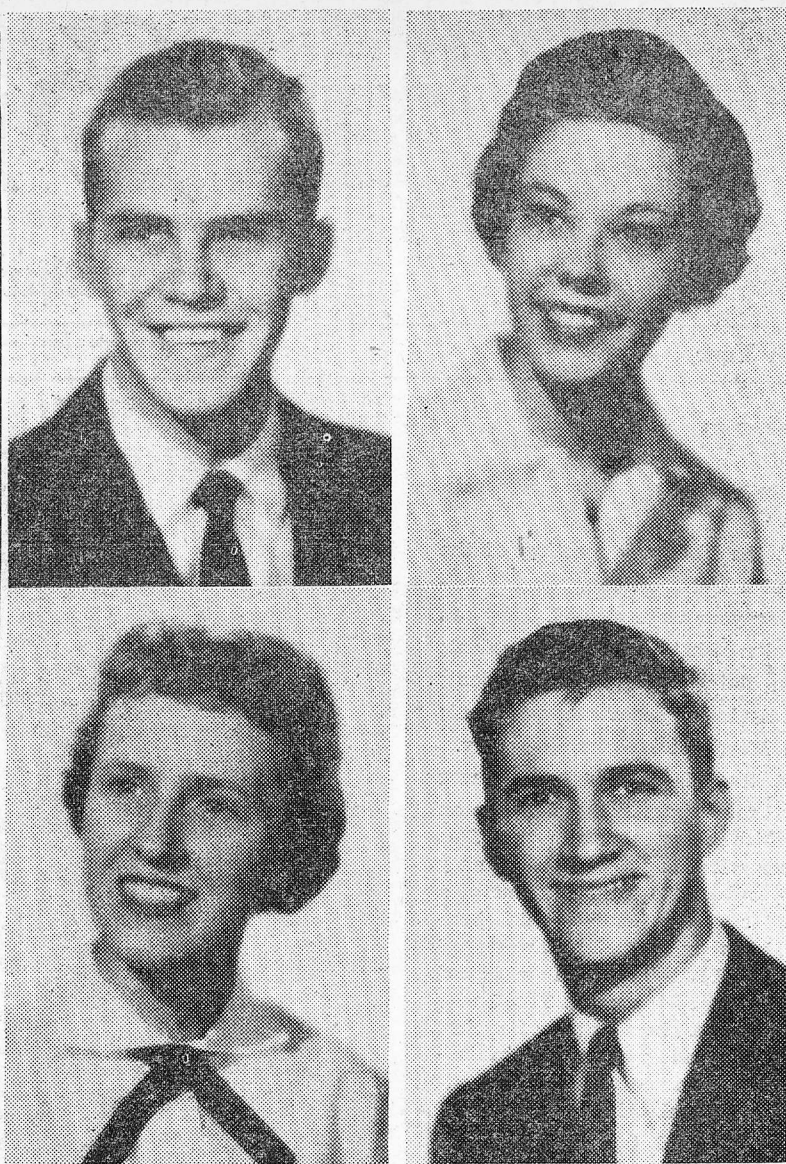

We hear the elder in the church talking about how much he swindled on this year's income tax. We see the young woman with the screaming, skinny baby on the bus. We see the filthy, vulgar writings on the walls of the rest room at the filling station. We see the retired couple from Vermont on their way to Florida in their Cadillac, because they need a rest.

We see all these things, and we can't understand; try as we may, we can't understand. We look at the dusty Bible and devotional book at the foot of the bed, and we wonder why we don't read them. We look at the preacher in our little church, and we wonder why he can't tell his people something. We wonder why he scolds them for drinking, so that if they refrain from drinking, they'll think they're good.

And then, we think about our little world here; a world of cynicism, and of false intellectual pride,

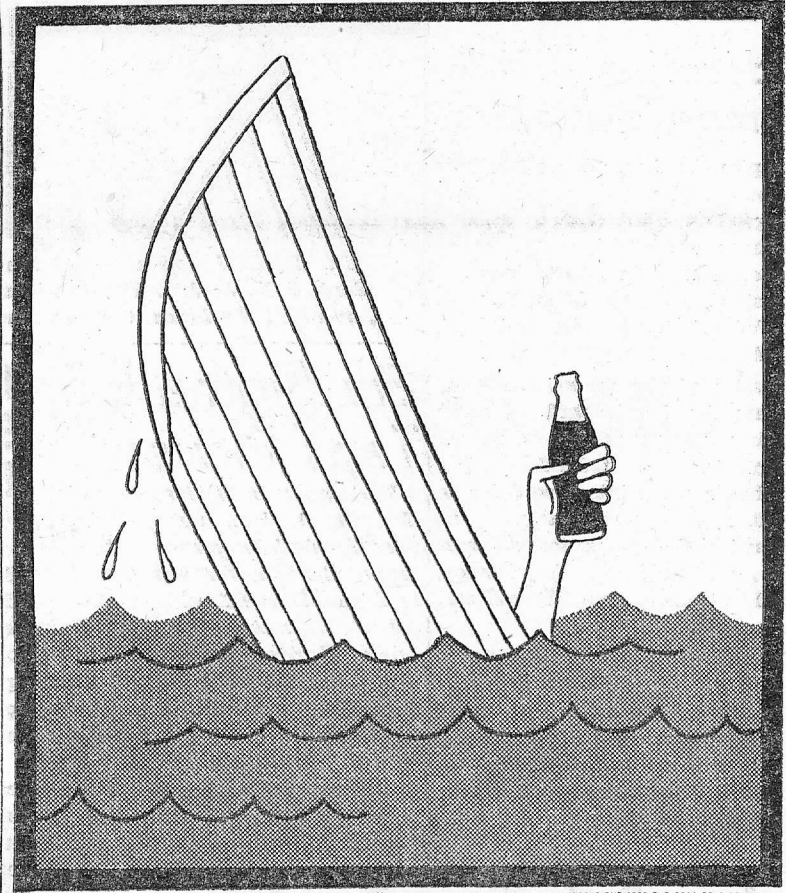

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# Lynx Rally Drops Memphis State Cross Town Rivals Fall 10-7

Southwestern's Lynx rallied behind the strong right arm of pitcher Bobby Rose to knock the props from under cross-town rival Memphis State University yesterday afternoon 10-7 at State.

## Track Meet Sat. Arkansas St. Is Foe

Coach Freeman Marr is gearing his track men for "Their toughest meet this year" with Arkansas State College Saturday at 2:30 P.M. on the Southwestern Track.

Bob Welsh will compete in the two mile run where his potential time of 10 minutes flat is a sure winner.

Mike Cody's 52 seconds in the 440 yard run and 2.03:7 in the 880 will make him a strong contender in both.

In the high hurdles Bill Howard will support Bill Carrell's 16 seconds with a close 17 seconds. Howard, a freshman with only one year of cross country running in his experience, is a valuable track man.

Versatile Sam Cole, who has given the Lynx tactics depth in the 100 yard dash, 220, 440, and mile relay, is said to be capable of 20 feet in the broad jump.

In other field events Danny Logan, disregarding his recent injury from a mis-put shot put, will pole vault Saturday. Last year he jumped eleven and one-half feet, and this year he may top 12 feet. June Davidson is expected to hurl the javelin over 155 feet. "MoMo" Waller, who consistently tops six feet in the high jump, will probably have to jump six-two to win this week.

Memphis State drew blood in the first inning on two walks off Lynx starter Bob Mansfield and a single. Southwestern bounced back in the second. Andy Gandy opened the inning with a walk and was sacrificed to second by Red McMillion. Mansfield then singled sharply to left field to plate the run.

In the third inning Southwestern picked up four runs while State countered with five for a 6-5 lead. This inning saw the exit from the game of both starters, Mansfield and MSU's Dean Smith. Rose came on to pitch for the Lynx, giving up one run on two hits, while striking out eight, over the last 6 and a third innings to gain his second win of the season against three losses. Joe Gummersbauch absorbed the loss for State. Lynx scoring in the inning came on a single by Joe Boals, a walk to Jettie Bowen, Joe Week's booming double to left center a walk to John Dunlap, and a wild pitch. State gathered theirs on a single, double, two hit batsmen, and a walk. This ended the scoring until the seventh when the Lynx put the game away on two walks, an error, and Gandy's double. Both teams picked up a run in the ninth.

This afternoon the Red and Black put their two game winning streak on the line against Howard College of Birmingham in the first of two games, the second to be played on Saturday. Woody Forbes is the probable starter for the Lynx today. Joe Weeks, hitting .459, and John Dunlap at .310 are pacing the home forces batting attack.

## Gothic Golfers Go In Tri-Meet Today

At 1 o'clock this afternoon Southwestern's golfers took on Mississippi Southern and Southeast Missouri State in a three-way meet at Memphis Country Club.

Freshman Stewart Thames held down the first slot for the Lynx, Harrison Herron the second, Bill Harris the third, and Bob Welsh the fourth. Welsh this season is doubling up, playing golf as well as running track.

Earlier, after two opening losses in which the matches were much closer than the scores, the Lynx tied Southeast Missouri State on State's course. Today the Lynx had the edge, playing on MCC, their home course.

In today's match the Lynx played what amounted to two matches. If they pulled them both out, Southwestern would have an even 2-1-2 record with about half the season gone.

Last Wednesday the Lynx were to have played Arkansas State, and they were to have a return engagement at MCC next Tuesday. The matches were cancelled because Arkansas was unable to secure a golf course for their home matches. Not playing these two matches was unfortunate for Southwestern who were heavily favored to rack up two victories.

The Lynx take on Ole Miss at MCC next Friday. Although Southwestern fell to the Reb golfers earlier, the Lynx will have an advantage playing on their own course. All interested persons are cordially invited to attend.

## Lynx Defeat Union; Pull Triple Play

Southwestern's baseballers opened the season with six straight losses before bouncing back to drop Union University of Jackson, Tennessee, 9-0 last Saturday afternoon. The first three games were all one run losses to three of the South's finest baseball teams. Loyola of New Orleans, winner of ten spring practice games and seven regular season games for a 17-2 record, slipped past the Lynx 5-4. Breazeale led the Lynx at the plate with two hits. L.S.U. made it by a 8-7 margin, but the Lynx bats were beginning to boom, with Joe Weeks getting a triple and Jettie Bowen a double.

In the third game against Northeast Louisiana Southwestern did everything but win the game. Bowen and Weeks crashed home runs over the left to right field fences respectively. John Dunlap picked up two hits for the Memphis forces while Red McMillion added three.

In the fifth inning with the bases loaded and no one out Northeastern Red Rushing sent a sharp shoe-string liner to short-stop Joe Boals. Boals caught the ball to throw to catcher Breazeale fired back to McMillion at second, whose relay to Weeks at first, completed a triple play for the Lynx.

The next three games saw Southwestern drop a 7-3 decision to Southeast Louisiana and two to St. Mary's 14-11 and 10-7.

Then came the 9-0 victory over Union. Bobby Rose went all the way for the Lynx giving up four hits along the shut-out trail. He struck out 13. Andy Gandy, Weeks, Bowen, and Dunlap all walloped home runs over the right field fence.

the UN drew up and sent around the world, Russia did lose a propaganda battle.

Through the Trusteeship Council the UN is the "big brother" for colonial countries, assuring them a fair deal in world affairs. The World Court has given decisions to many countries who have asked its aid in arbitration of their problems with each other. The Court has no enforcing agency except the good will of the participants; the countries do not bring vital problems to the Court. Yet the Court has performed many desirable services in the line of arbitration of disputes between countries.

Such are some functions the UN is performing. But how does the UN stand in the present power struggle between the US and the USSR?

The UN was established with the presupposition that there would be cooperation between powers. That cooperation does not exist now. Is the UN therefore ineffective?

Although it is true that the UN is effective only in keeping small wars from becoming big ones, it does perform many functions which help keep the peace. The UN attempts to block defence measures. It provides for local security pacts; it draws up resolutions giving its opinion of actions of various countries. Perhaps most important, it provides an arena in which the powers can talk over their problems and not fight over them. It brings world public opinion together and brings issues into the open. In the final analysis, none of these functions would prevent a clash between the blocs most likely, but it is an attempt, a step in the right direction—the best one we have at present.

Meanwhile, the UN should try to build up its police force. Paradoxically, the best way to keep peace at present is to be ready to fight. Readiness is a strong deterrent to the non-aggressive powers to push back the aggressor if need be, knowing the UN will stand behind them.

What the world needs, Gunnar said, is not peace—we can get that by yielding to the aggressor—but security, the knowledge and ability to meet whatever crisis comes. The ideal function of the UN is to give the world that security. What the real one is remains to be seen.

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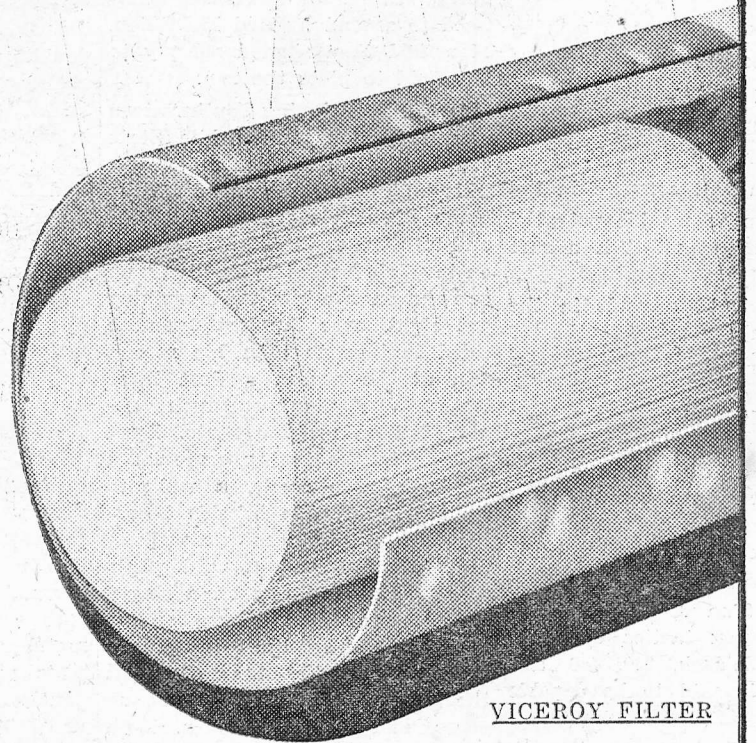
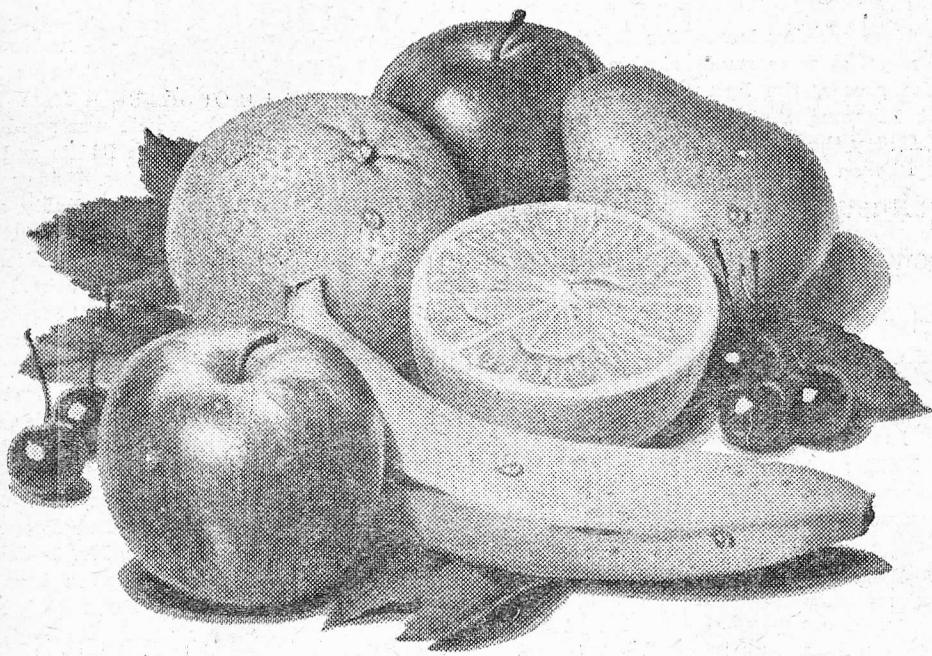
