Social Theory: AS 275 Fall 1998

Course Statement

This course aims to prepare you for upper-division course work in anthropology and sociology by examining the key contributions to anthropological and sociological theory. Class meetings will be a combination of lecture and discussion.

The course will integrate anthropological and sociological insights thematically in order to examine key areas such as structuralism, Marxism, evolutionism, postmodernism and interpretive theory. Emphasis will be placed on the philosophical context of each thinker, the answers their works provide, and the questions they raise. Given the challenging nature of the readings, we will spend a considerable amount of time discussing their meaning and make every attempt to draw out their practical relevance. In this sense the course is as much an intellectual exercise in self-understanding as it is a survey of classical and (to a lesser extent) contemporary social theory. The questions you bring to class as well as your contributions to discussions are therefore most important.

In addition to our Tuesday and Thursday meetings, we will also meet on four occasions during the semester to discuss course material in more detail. Prior to these meetings, which will be held on Monday evenings from 5-7pm, you will prepare an 8-10 essay in response to an assigned question. These meetings will give each of you an opportunity to discuss your essays and relate them to the material we have been studying. writing
