Scholar Protests Distorted Picture

Dear Editor,

Your editorial, "Someone Failed," intentionally or not, gave a very distorted and unfair picture of the activities of the Student Council this year.

You omitted all mention of the innovations and successes which have led most of the students to consider this the most successful Council in recent years. In addition, you did not even give a fair picture of the failures of the program.

Apparently your main objection was to the freshman hazing program. Granted that it was not perfectly coordinated or carried out, but it was certainly no worse in every-day application than those of former years, and judging by the comments of freshmen and S-Clubbers, the ruder aspects were quite adequately covered.

The bonfire fiasco was not the result of official planning and seems to have been the result of the active cooperation of a large part of the student body.

The freshman Talent Show was a resounding success — certainly adding more to the enjoyment of both new and old students than any amount of puerile "hazing" could have done.

You seem to feel that "rain" is insufficient excuse for lack of a pajama race — revealing more than a scholarly disdain for elements. The whole affair could hardly have been postponed after all the arrangements were made and anticipation of the end of the period built up among the

These girls meet many new people each day, and it is only natural that they should find potential husbands among their passengers. Each girl works an average of one and one-half years, and by that time she has usually found a husband.

The stewardesses are one of airlines most valuable assets, for they are the ones who meet and help the passengers.

Southwestern seems to have made another first, for Mr. J. W. Meyer, general traffic manager, says that he believes there are more Southwestern alumnae working for his company as stewardesses than there are from any other college or university.

Evelyn Givens said, "Mine is an exciting job. No two days are alike while I'm on flights." So, if you girls would like to work in an interesting job, by all means start thinking about the airlines, for they offer one of the most exciting careers a girl can have, and you, too, might be able to add your name to this impressive list of girls who have succeeded in a very competitive business.

Dorsey Band Plays Ball With Pop-Ups

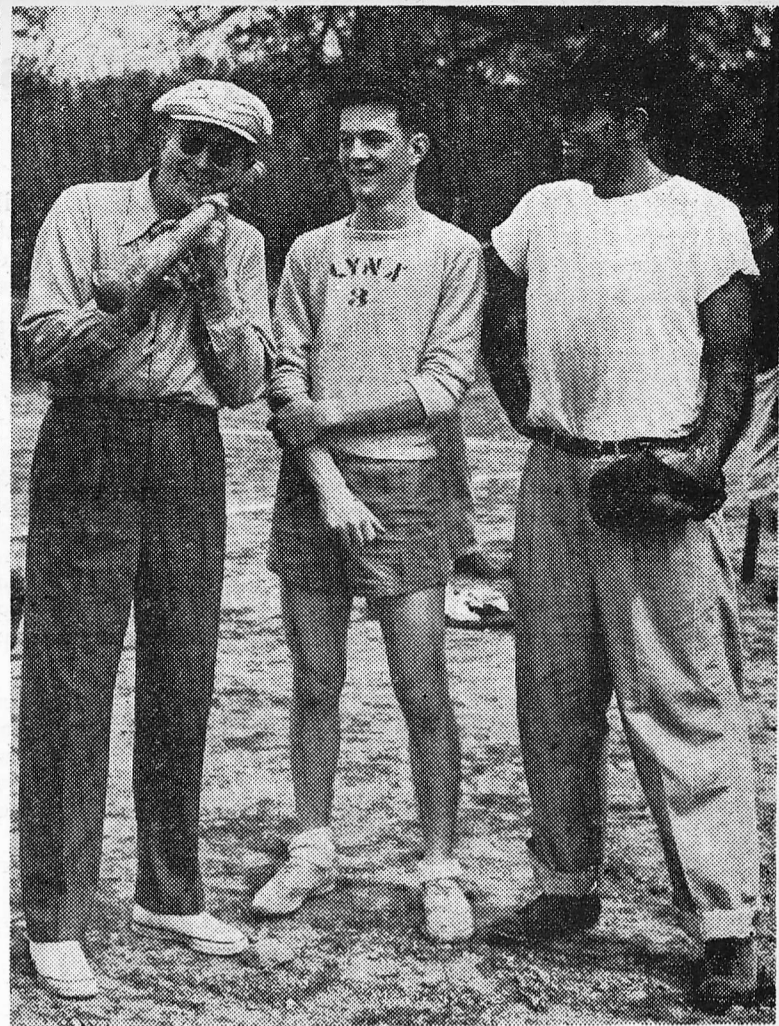
To my Dorsey's nationally known swing band lost a softball contest last week to the Southwestern "Pop-Ups."
