MODERATOR IS S. P. U. GRADUATE IN CLASS OF 1897

Dr. Kirk One of the "Old-Timers" at S. P. U.

28 YEARS A PASTOR

Outstanding Minister In Southern Church

Dr. Harris E. Kirk, for the past 28 years the pastor of the Franklin Street Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, Md., and a graduate of old S. P. U. in the class of 1897, was chosen moderator of the sixty-eighth general assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church in Atlanta, Ga. last Thursday.

Of four men nominated for the highest office in the assembly, one later withdrawing, Dr. Kirk received the honor by a large vote.

Dr. Kirk is one of the most widely known of S. P. U.'s graduates, as is shown by the vote accorded him at the church gathering. His work as pastor of the Franklin Street church for 28 years and his subsequent activity in scholastic and religious circles for the past 40 years easily won for him the office.

Entering S. P. U. in the year 1894 he distinguished himself by winning his degree in three years, graduating in the class of 1897. He is a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

After graduation Dr. Kirk was pastor of the Presbyterian Church, of Nashville, Tenn., for two years, going from there to Florence, Ala. In 1901 he became pastor of the Franklin Street church.

He did not confine his endeavors to the Franklin Street church, but also became the university minister at Princeton, and since then has been connected with the University of Virginia, University of Chicago, Union Seminary, a Sprunt lecturer and also a Carew lecturer. In 1919 he was acting professor of homiletics in Hartford Seminary. He was moderator of the Synod of Virginia in 1911.

Included among Dr. Kirk's published works are "Religion of Power," "The Consuming Fire," and numerous contributions to the Union Seminary Magazine and Biblical Review and Record of Christian Work.

It will be recalled that Southwestern bestowed on Dr. Kirk the LL.D. degree in November, 1925, at the Jubilee Celebration held here.

Two S. P. U. Grads On Present Faculty

Two prominent members of Southwestern's faculty this year are graduates of S. P. U.

Dean Eli Daniel McDougall, of the class of 1893, besides his duties as dean is also professor of Bible.

Prof. Ernest Haden, of the class of 1924, is associate professor of French.

Both men joined the faculty ranks in September, 1926.

REV. W. H. McINTOSH, D. D., '06, is one of the well-known members of the synod of Mississippi and at the present time is pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Hattiesburg, Miss.

JUDGE NATHAN L. BACHAMAN, '97, Chattanooga, Tenn., a former member of the Supreme Court bench, is engaged in the practice of his profession at Chattanooga, Tenn.

MR. B. A. PATCH, '85, Clarksville, Tenn., is President of the A. H. Patch Mfg. Co., Clarksville, Tenn., and is a member of the Board of Directors of Southwestern.

LARGEST CLASS IN THREE YEARS READY TO LEAVE

Only Five Out of 41 Will Receive B. S. Degree

FULL PROGRAM SET

Alumni Day Is Set For Monday, June 4

Forty-one seniors, the largest graduation class since Southwestern has been in Memphis, are expecting to receive their sheepskins at Commencement Exercises which will be held in Hardie Auditorium, June 5, at 10 a. m.

Prior to the awarding of degrees the seniors will be busily occupied with a full round of annual and social events.

The seniors will attend the Baccalaureate Sermon by the Rev. Charles Edward Diehl, president of Southwestern, at Second Presbyterian church at 11 a. m. on June 3. They will be present at the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. meeting that night at St. Mary's Cathedral to hear the Rev. Raimundo De Ovies, chaplain of the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn.

Each year the outgoing senior class plants a tree on the campus in their memory. This ceremony will be held on Monday morning, June 4, at 11 o'clock in front of Palmer Hall.

Monday will be alumni day at the institution, and the class of 1928 will be honor guests at the banquet to be held by the alumni at 6:30 p. m. in the Hugh M. Neely Hall. Special receptions will be given the seniors by their fraternity or sorority groups in the evening. The graduates will be feted by the faculty at a reception on the college campus Monday night from 8:30 to 10 o'clock, which will be followed by the senior class ceremony in the Bell Room.

This impressive meeting will be attended by seniors only. The final Pan-Hellenic Council dance of the year will be given that night at the Elks' Club room 10 to 2.

Tuesday, June 5, will be the last day that the seniors will be able to call themselves "students of Southwestern," or at 10 o'clock in the morning Graduating Exercises will be held for them. The Rev. 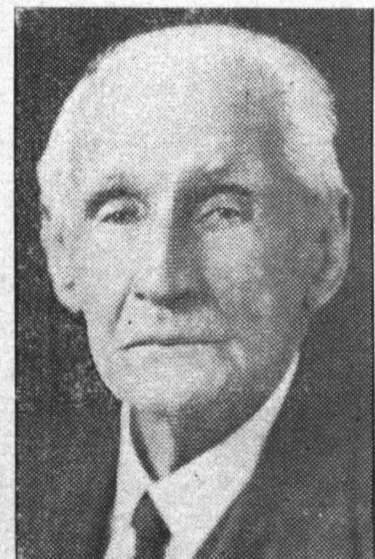

93-Year-Old Masonic Graduate Still Washing In Cold Water

Mr. Elliot is Very Active Despite His Record of 70 Crops

Washing his hair in cold water every morning has given him his present bushy, snow-white crest. Thomas Elliot, 93, oldest alumnus of Masonic College, now Southwestern, declares.

Mr. Elliot left his farm in Christian County, Ky., recently, to come to Memphis to visit Dr. Charles E. Diehl, president of Southwestern. A gracious, distinguished looking old gentleman of 93, he does not wear spectacles and his hearing is normal. His walk is erect and his mind alert.

Mr. Elliot has made 73 crops, principally tobacco, on his farm in Christian County. He went there immediately after he graduated from Masonic College, Clarksville, Tenn., in 1854. "I think I am the only living human being who connects the Southwestern University in its incipency and its present magnificence," he said.

His chief interest besides farming, he says, has been in trying to help those who want to get an education. "Fi-

nally, I made my first speech on 'The Best Use of Money.' At 12 years of age, my mother had told me to learn to be a good listener if I wished to have people like me. You know, everybody likes to be popular. But I broke my general rule at 70."

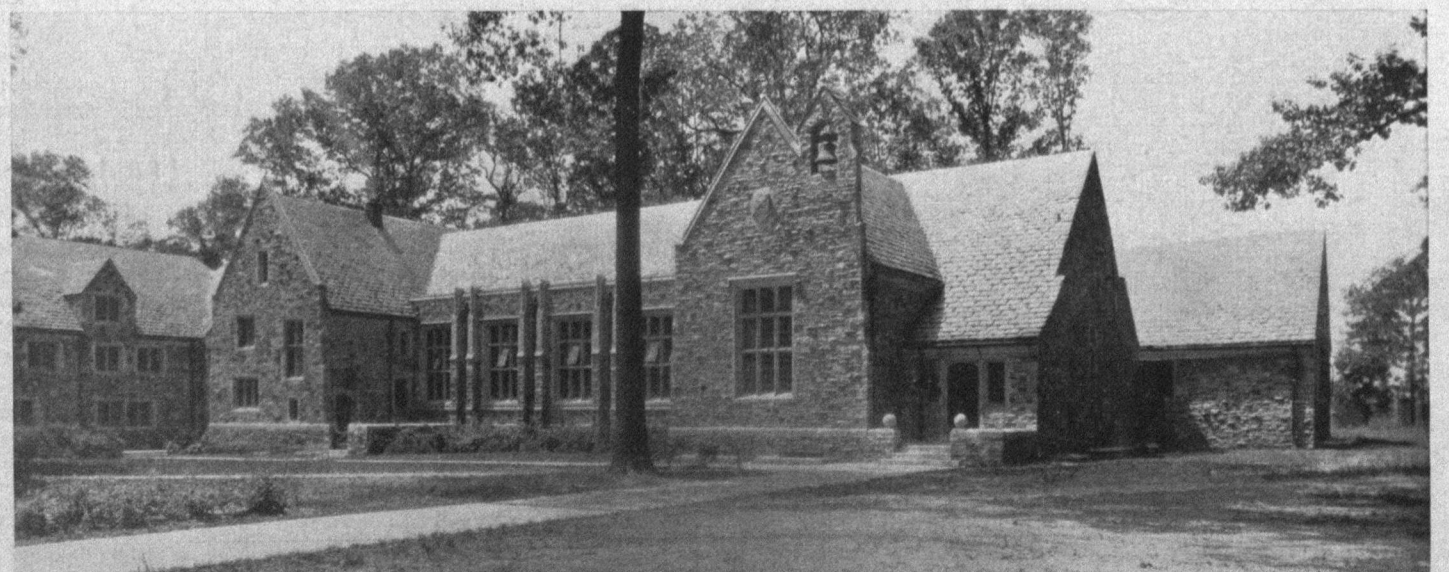

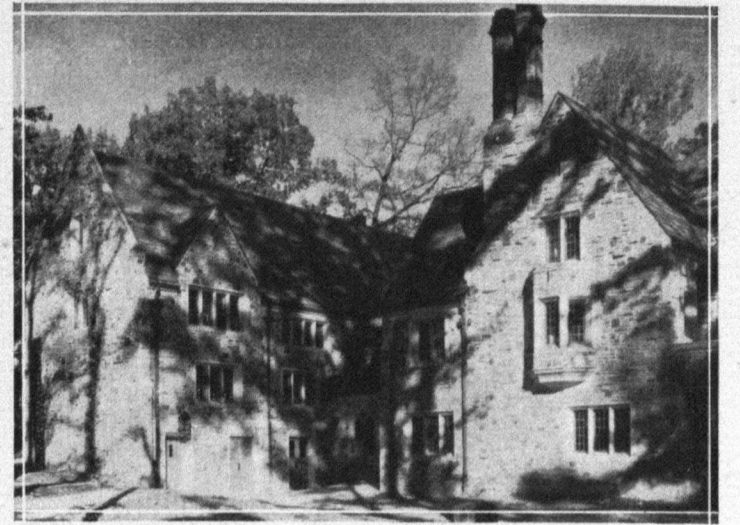
WHERE THAT HOMELIKE ATMOSPHERE PREDOMINATES

WHEN 400 SYNOD DELEGATES VISITED SOUTHWESTERN

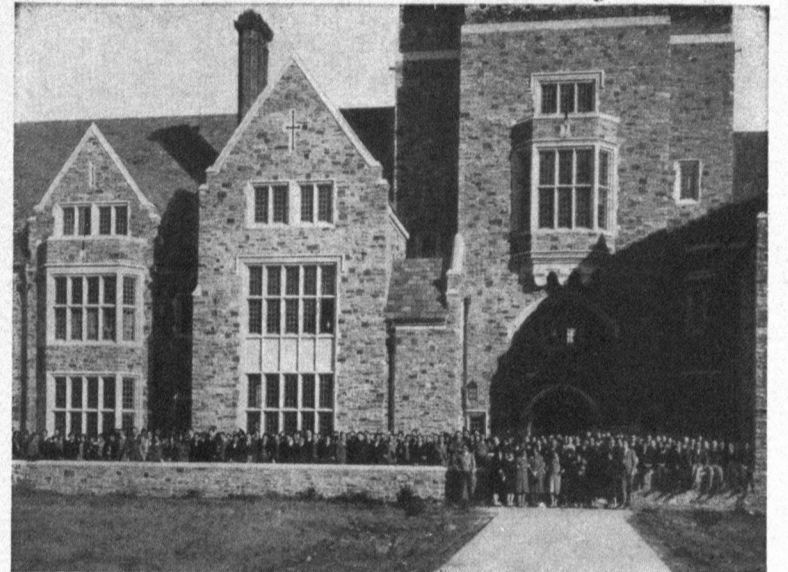

BEFORE PALMER ENTRANCE



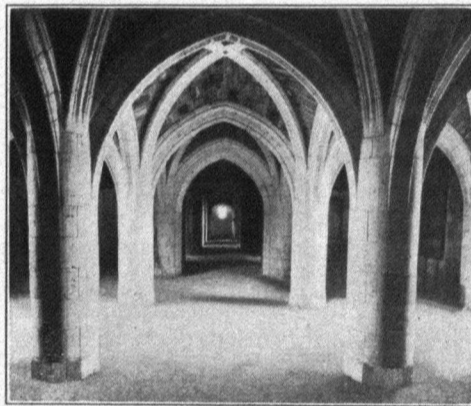
THE SAME OLD CLARKSVILLE BELL



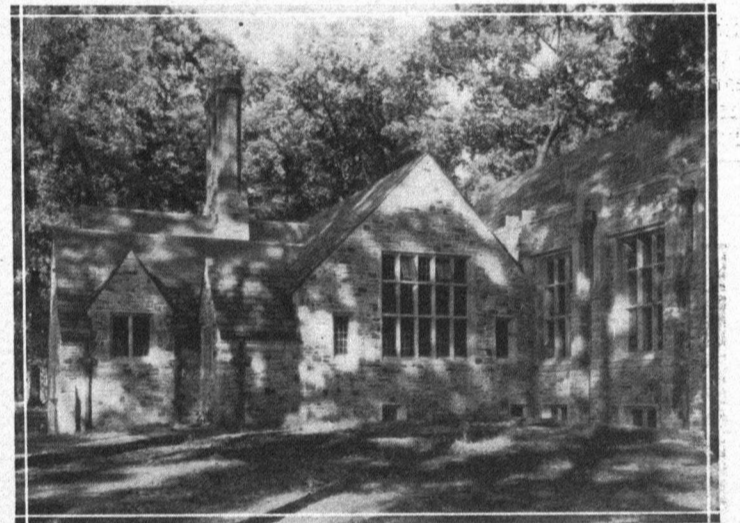

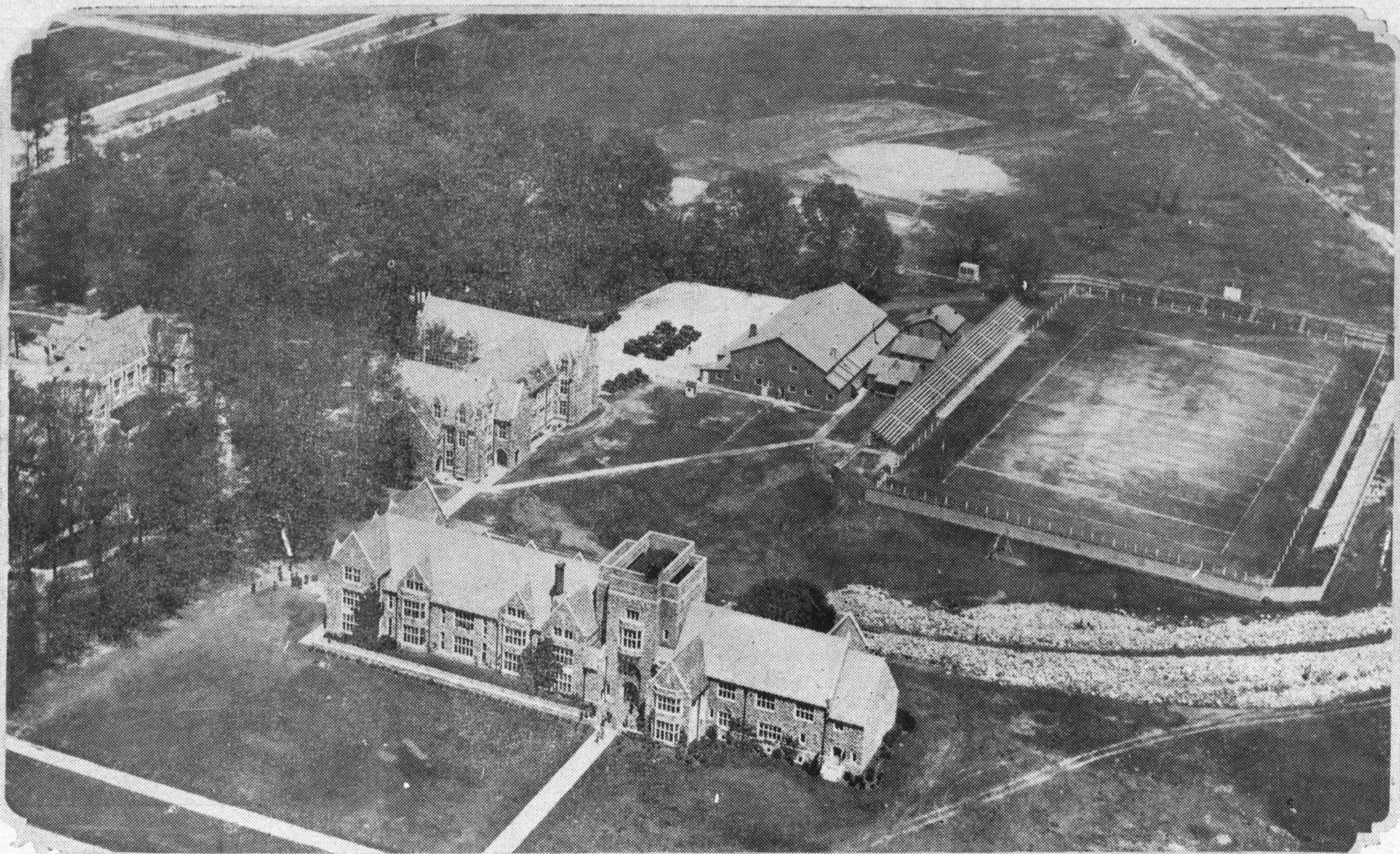

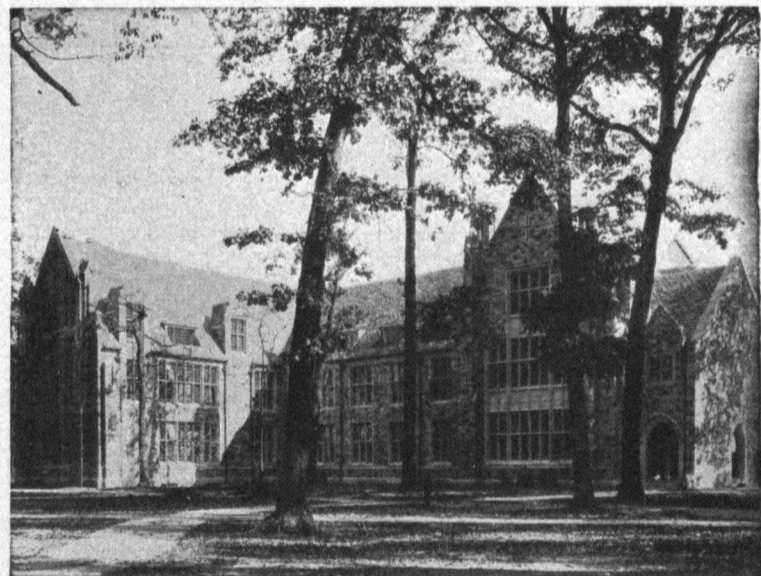
