## Course Statement

Sociology is a social science that takes as its unit of analysis sociality - the condition of existing socially. We are thrown at birth into a world not of our own making - a world of language, groups, institutions and complex organizations that are the products of centuries of social interaction and organization. Sociology is the study of this social world, its structures and processes, and our mutually constitutive relationship with it.

We will begin this course by examining sociology's origins, theoretical assumptions, and historical applications, and then proceed to examine the insights and questions to which sociology has given rise. We will then turn our attention toward doing sociology as an ontological activity. My goal is to provide you with a sociological understanding of our social reality and your existence within it.

Each class meeting will consist of a lecture (approximately 50 minutes), a short break, and then a discussion about the lecture and its relation to the assigned readings. Without consistent reading our discussion of the material, and your learning of it, will be superficial and disappointing. Please do not remain enrolled in this class unless you are willing to pledge that you will consistently complete your readings on time.

Attendance is mandatory because you will not be able to access the bulk of class material from any source other than the lectures and discussions (there is no textbook for this course). More than 3 unexcused absences will qualify you for an automatic F.
