STUDENT ELECTIONS HOLD DAY

COUNCIL VOTES MONEY TO SEND SQUAD TO MEET

Raspberry, Wright, Ford Dode, Bynum Going

TRY ALL EVENTS

Contingent to Practice While En Route

Southwestern students are so certain that they can win the annual S. I. A. A. track meet at Clinton, S. C., on May 11 that they have voted \$150 to defray expenses of Coach Raspberry and a team of four athletes.

The Student Council, representing the student body, voted this sum from the common tills. Raspberry will take Dode Farnsworth, Roger Wright, Perry Bynum and Morris Ford as the Southwestern contingent. The quintet will leave Memphis by auto on May 8, and will be on the road three days. Each day they will stop en route at different colleges for light workouts in order to preclude any signs of stiffness.

Practically every college in the S. I. A. A. will be entered, which totals more than 35. Raspberry believes that if the Lynx aggregation can amass 30 points they will win the meet. The four men he is taking are all accomplished at their individual events, and were first honor winners at the meet at Union University last Saturday.

COUNT ON QUARTET

Farnsworth will be entered in the discus, shot put, broad jump, high and low hurdles, and 100-yard dash. He won first in all these events at Union. Dode is being counted on for at least three first places.

Wright will run in the half mile, mile and two-mile races. He set two records on the Union track. This is his first year as an athlete, and in the fall races, intramural track meet and at Union, he has emerged ahead of the field each time.

Bynum will enter the half-mile, mile and two-mile events. He has been sick, but has recovered and is practicing to get back in shape again. Bynum has won several long distance runs in Memphis.

Ford has excellent chances, Raspberry thinks, of triumphing in the broad jump, pole vault, high jump and low hurdle events. He tied with Farnsworth in the broad jump last Saturday and cleared the bar at 11 feet in the pole vault. He skims over the bar at 12 feet in practices on Fargason field.

Eight Basketball Men Get Sweaters

Eight basketball letters and sweaters have been presented to the Southwestern Lynx varsity by Coach Pos Elam as a recognition of the team's effort during the past season.

Those receiving the black jersey coat sweaters with red "S's" are Captain Billy Hughes, Dode Farnsworth, Charlie Diehl, Bob Russell, Charles Terry, Chauncey Barbour, Flint Lidon and Morris Ford.

Coach Elam said that Henry "Chi" Waring earned a letter and sweater, but the sweaters were ordered after his death.

Lynx Runners Swamp Union Break 5 Union Track Records

Hercules and Mercury, renowned Greek athletes, would have cringed with shame at the Union-Southwestern track meet at Jackson, Tenn., last Saturday at the performances of one Dode Farnsworth and one Roger Wright.

Dode placed first in six events against a Union team which has shown itself this year to be a strong contender for the S. I. A. A. track championship. After winning the 100-yard dash in the fast time of 10.6 seconds, he straightway in fast succession won first honors in the discus throw, shot put, 220-yard high hurdles, broad jump and 220-yard low hurdles.

Roger, known as "Scotchy" because of his ancestry, could not suffer his pride to "lose" either the half-mile, mile or two-mile race events. One, or at the most two, such runs is a big day's assignment; but he proceeded to run all three and win each in turn, setting two track records at Union in the process.

Captain Morris Ford was no small factor in the final score of 64 to 53 points. He cleared the bar at 11 feet in the pole vault event to win first place. He and Dode eliminated both Union broad jumpers.

Union won both places in the 220-yard dash, as well as the mile relay. Stewart, of Union, was an easy winner of the javelin throw, with Powell, of Southeastern, second. Hewlett and Peeples, of Union, were veritable speedbursts and won both first and second places in the 440-yard dash.

Six track records were made during the meet, five by Southwestern men. Stewart, of Union, broke his previous record with the javelin, tossing the weapon 158 feet 2 inches. Farnsworth and Ford broke the broad jump record, Wright the mile and two-mile time, Ford the pole vault, and Farnsworth the low hurdles in the time of 27.8 seconds.

Farnsworth was high scorer with 30 points, Wright was second with 15, followed by Hewlett, of Union, with 14 1/4 points. Ford scored 12, Robertson 4 and Powell 3.

Political Stir Following Y. W. C. A. Election Is Branded "Deplorable"

Student Council Writes Letter of Condemnation; Advisory Committee to Query Officers

In anticipation of the customary bitterness attendant on the annual political scrap at Southwestern, the Student Council went on record as being hostile to office patronage and group combinations. Each member of the Council gave a hearty assent to the proposition as outlined by President Crawford McGivaren.

The personnel of the present Council is representative of the several dominant student groups, both fraternal and extracurricular. The pledge of the members to discountenance all forms and semblances of politicking was thought the most effective way to curb formation of cliques if such should be the tendency.

The anti-political proposition met with general favor on the campus. Student leaders foresaw no hitch toward open and fair elections. After the first general election, which was run off about two weeks ago, there spread rumors of "politics." The Council investigated. While no prima facie evidence was disclosed, yet irregularities were so palpable that at least an "understanding" seemed likely.

The letter on the left was addressed to Mrs. P. N. Rhodes, of the Y. W. C. A. advisory committee, and was signed by every member of the Council except the retiring Y. W. C. A. president (out of deference to her she was not asked to sign) and a co-ed member. The letter on the right is the reply from the advisory committee.

Dear Madame:
The Student Council of Southwestern wishes to call your attention to what seems to us to be a rather deplorable occurrence. It has been pointed out to us that the recent Y. W. C. A. election was dominated by the worst kind of politics, that of "office-swapping."

The Student Council is on record as being opposed to all organization politics in student elections and is pledged to do all it can to prevent just such a thing as has taken place. Had we known that this thing was to be perpetrated we would have taken steps to have stopped it. Since we did not, there seems to be only one course open to us and that is to appeal to you and your organization.

We feel that an organization which is supposed to be dominated by a spirit of service and fellowship, as the Y. W. C. A. is, is worse than useless on our campus when it is used as a means of political bartering.

We hope that you will understand our position in the matter and that you will do what you can to correct it.

We appreciate the friendly spirit of confidence on the part of the Student Council which was shown by their sending this communication, and we share your regret at the condition which you have brought to our attention. Playing politics is not a good thing and we believe that every thoughtful person of high ideals would disapprove of undemocratic methods. More than ever is this true of a religious organization.

We are not familiar with the details of this matter, and we do not wish to be unjust to any one or to any organization. However, we will have a meeting with the Cabinet in the near future and if there have been irregularities which should be corrected we will try to see that in the future elections in the Y. W. C. A. will be conducted on the same high plane which we desire to characterize all that occurs on the campus of Southwestern.

INSTALL MONDAY

Johnson, Fortas Oppose In V.-P. Race

Speculation as to the next student body president was rife on the campus Thursday following the nomination of four men for this office. Frederick Heidelberg, Morris Ford, Bobby Lloyd and Robert Russell were announced as candidates for the office.

Two men were announced for the office of vice-president. Albert Johnson and Abe Fortas will fight it out for the honor.

Janet Moody and Frances Crawford oppose each other for the office of secretary-treasurer of the student body.

Crawford McGivaren, retiring student body president, heard the nominations from the floor following chapel exercises. Voting was held Friday morning. Should no one of the four candidates for president receive a majority vote, a run-off between the two highest will be held in chapel Saturday morning.

CONTROL BALLOTS

A committee composed of five senior men on the Student Council were in complete charge of election work Friday. Warner Hall, retiring vice-president of the student body, officiated in the absence of McGivaren. Moore Moore, Luther Southworth, Mike Wailes and John Johnson regulated the balloting during the voting. Wailes opened, Johnson read, and Southworth and Moore tallied the ballots before the student group immediately following voting. A run-off will be held Saturday if necessary.

The new officers will be installed Monday. Prediction of the winners is futile, as this is the first year that an anti-politics policy has been in effect. The president of the new publication board will be elected after the installation services Monday.

Freshman, sophomore and junior classes will elect new officers next Tuesday, as well as class representatives on the publication board.

Elections to the Honor Council will be held next Thursday.

This will conclude the main elections, as the editors and business managers of the three student publications have already been elected.

Elijah Production Will Be Given Soon

The Town and Gown Club, composed of the Southwestern Glee Club and Miss Jean Johnson's group of singers, will sing selections from the oratorio, "Elijah," May 14 in the concert hall of the Municipal auditorium.

The mixed chorus of 50 voices is being directed by Prof. Eric G. Haden, assisted by Miss Johnson.

Harry Steudermann will be the guest organist and will play selections on the new \$100,000 organ which was recently dedicated in the auditorium. Mrs. Cheek, of Chattanooga, will be the visiting soloist. She is a dramatic soprano. Darnell Morrison and Joe Haden will be the men soloists.

Annuals In Two Weeks

The 1929 Lynx annuals, which are expected on the campus about May 15, will be distributed from the Publication office, states Editor Mike Wailes.

"No annual will be given out unless directly to the student," says Wailes. "No student will be allowed to sign for any one's annual except his own."

OLE MISS MAN CHOSEN COACH

Burke Succeeds Elam As Lynx Mentor

Webster Burke, star of three sports at Ole Miss, was appointed head coach for Southwestern Wednesday by Dr. Charles E. Diehl. The appointment was made upon the recommendation of Neely Mallory, advisory football coach, and Norman Monaghan, president, and Hunter Lane, secretary, of the Southwestern Athletic Association.

Burke was chosen from a group of thirty applicants, among them being some of the outstanding coaches in the Tri-States. Burke succeeds Pos Elam, who resigned in January.

The new coach is a graduate of Ole Miss. After his graduation from that university Burke served as assistant coach to Homer Hazel. He is a native of Hattiesburg, Miss. During his career at Ole Miss he played three years as center of the football team. He played guard on the cage team, and he was a pitcher on the baseball squad. He is at present pitcher for the Jackson team of the Cotton States League.

Burke was the ideal man for the job of Southwestern coach, because he had excelled in all three sports in which Southwestern engages to a great extent. Neely Mallory will continue to serve as general grid and backfield coach.

The Lynx teams hailed the appointment of Burke with great delight and Southwestern athletes are looking forward to a successful season under the new coach.

Palpitating Prof Waxes Realistic In Play Love Act

Boiling love! Bursting passion! Throbbing pulse and fiery speech! Dr. J. A. Ross, in company with his unspotted leopard skin, thrilled the player-audience last Wednesday night as only Mark Anthony could have done if he had re-enacted his tempestuous seances with Cleopatra.

And Madame Bruce, with her flowing gown and cramping hip piece, not only vamped the amorous Ross, who played the part of "Paris," but held the male audience spell-bound by her wily winks and tantalizing walk. Cromwell and Kidd met Colbert and Tomlinson, and Long and Williams were pitted against Sanders and Daugherty in the opening round last Friday. Cromwell, at the end of the first nine holes, was one down, but gained the lead in the second lap and won three up and two to go. Kidd won his match two up. The scores follow: Cromwell 36, 36-72; Colbert 37, 39-76; Kidd 41, 43-84; Tomlinson, 42, 44-86; Kidd and Cromwell received six points and Tomlinson and Colbert three.
