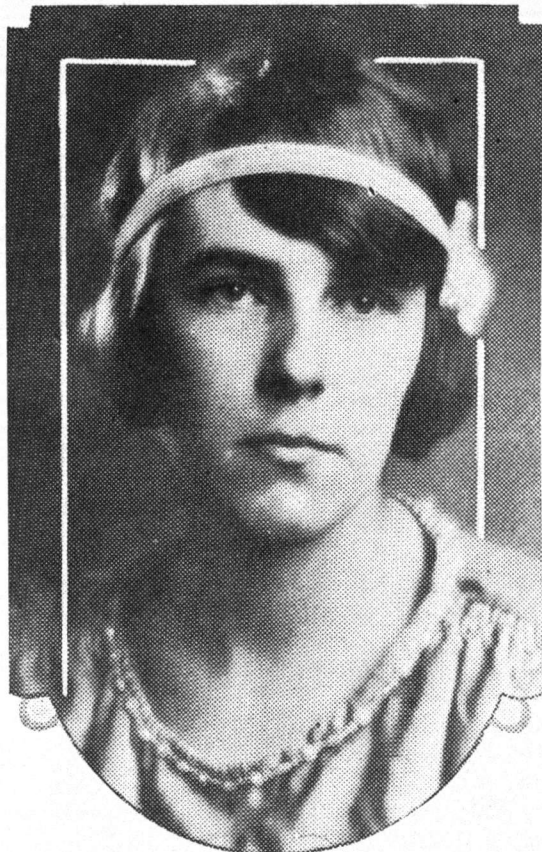
### CHI ALPHAS FETE NEW OFFICERS

Bevis has been conducting a school tournament the past week with more than fifty entries. The members of the tennis team were seeded. Several of the professors, including Davis, Ross, Rhodes and Huber, are taking part. First round matches will be played by Monday.

Crawford McGivaren and Billy Hughes, heralds, conducted the new pledges to the rostrum, where Dr. E. D. McDougall welcomed the new men into the organization.

The chapel service was conducted by the fraternity. Crawford McGivaren read a passage from the Bible and Dr. McDougall offered the morning prayer, following with a talk to the new pledges.

Several honorary memberships will be given to Memphians who have performed outstanding services both to the institution and to the city, it is understood. The names of the recipients of the honorary memberships have not been announced.

"You men have been chosen to this high honor because of your sustained interest in advancing the work of the institution and the student body," said Dr. McDougall to the five pledges. "You have been able to look over the fence of your respective circle of friends and have been able to build up for yourself a close friendship with the entire student body."

The active membership of O. D. K. includes Billy Hughes, Crawford McGivaren and Mike Wailes, seniors, and Morris Ford and Bobby Lloyd, juniors. Faculty members are Dr. E. D. McDougall, Dr. W. R. Atkinson, Dr. R. P. Strickler and Dr. W. R. Cooper. Wes Adams, freshman athletic coach, is an alumni member.

The new pledges will be initiated in May, it is understood, and will meet with the active chapter at a luncheon May 1 and 15.

O. D. K. fraternity was founded at Washington and Lee University in 1914. At present there are 24 active chapters in the United States.

Unlike Phi Beta Kappa, selection is made on five points. These are scholarship, athletics, social leadership, including conspicuous service to the institution, publications, and non-athletic activities.

THREE-FOLD PURPOSE  
The purpose of the fraternity is three-fold:

First, to recognize men who have attained a high standard of efficiency in collegiate activities, and to inspire others to strive for conspicuous attainments along similar lines.

Second, to bring together the most representative men in all phases of collegiate life and thus to create an organization which will help to mould the sentiment of the institution on questions of local and intercollegiate interest.

Third, to bring together members of the faculty and student body of the institution on a basis of mutual interest and understanding.

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## Portrayed and Actual Life

So much blather is being purveyed by so-called well-informed wits and nit-wits concerning the life and habits of modern college folk, that it is very obnoxious to those who actually go to college and know college life to see, read and hear such misrepresentations on both the screen, printed page, and thru conversation.

It is well to read the opinions of prominent educators who are authorities on college life. The consensus is that only the frivolous minority indulge in drinking and "petting" parties, much to the chagrin of humor editors who are loathe to admit of any decency in college ranks.

These authorities should be given consideration: S. H. Goodnight, University of Wisconsin, said, "I think our students are inclined to spend too much money on their dress and personal appearance. They are decidedly very well dressed. There is a frivolous minority which does, I think, indulge in drinking, recking and the like, in an attempt to be 'collegiate.' This type, of course, does not excel in either scholastic standing or student activities. He is a sidelight bystander."

Oscar A. Ullrich, Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, said, "I am convinced that our students are better morally, socially and scholastically than were the students two decades ago. They are more frank, but at heart they are as good or better."

J. L. Richmond, University of the City of Toledo, declared, "The new collegian is more of a man, more independent, more disposed to question authority, more power to him."

S. Arthur Johnson, Colorado Agricultural College, said, "Our college students were never finer than they are today, and my experience goes back over nearly thirty years. There is more idealism, more energy. Students do not care to be thought of as the type mentioned in your letter."

Louis H. Dirks, DePauw University, says, "The tendency of our students is to be well groomed."

W. H. Hughes, Ashbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky, declared, "We have not a single student who would fit the 'collegiate' type of the humorous press."

H. H. Mumnick, Valparaiso University, says, "Our student bodies compare very favorably with, and, in some instances, far excel those of preceding generations."

E. F. Bosworth, Oberlin College, said, "Carelessness and discourtesy are not sanctioned at Oberlin."

Frank A. Neff, University of Wichita, said, "The 'collegiate' type is not found on our campus and so we have no data with which to answer."

J. H. Justian, University of South Dakota, said, "The rah rah collegiate is as much a monstrosity on our campus as he is in his own home town. College students today far excel as a group in all the better things of life those of my generation."

Charles L. Rich, Dakota Wesleyan University, said, "College students who try to live up to the public caricature of the 'collegiate' do so to their own discredit on their own campus."
