LYNX MEET MAJORS TOMORROW

Beta Sigma Granted Chapter In Sigma Nu

Change To Be Within Thirty Days

Local To Be Installed By Nearby Chapter of Sigma Nu

Beta Sigma, local Southwestern fraternity, has been granted a chapter by the High Council of Sigma Nu Fraternity. The final ratification vote was passed by the collegiate chapters of the national fraternity following the favorable vote of the Grand Chapter meeting last summer.

Induction of Beta Sigma actives and alumni members into Sigma Nu will be within 30 days, with Sigma Nus from either Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Sewanee, or Kentucky conducting the installation services.

Beta Sigma was organized when Southwestern moved to Memphis by Rev. Wayne W. Gray, of Clarendon, Ark., for the sole purpose of petitioning Sigma Nu for a charter. The local chapter has refused several offers from other national fraternities, remaining steadfast in their original purpose.

Dr. Robertson, Goucher Head, Asserts Individual Pupils Must Be Understood

Gives Varied and Interesting Ideas On Education In Interview with Sou'wester Reporter

Dr. David Allan Robertson, president of Goucher College and member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate, said that the important factor in education today is to understand the individual student. He gave a Sou'wester reporter an exclusive interview after the dinner given in his honor by Dr. Diehl.

Dr. Robertson went on to say that every individual student has a right to be understood. He said, "Students shouldn't be sent to college, but should want to go. There is room for every type of institution, large and small, vocational and otherwise. I believe that every institution and subject taught is to some extent vocational. Large corporations today want youth with well-developed personalities, not mere mechanical skill which is apt to become obsolete within a few years."

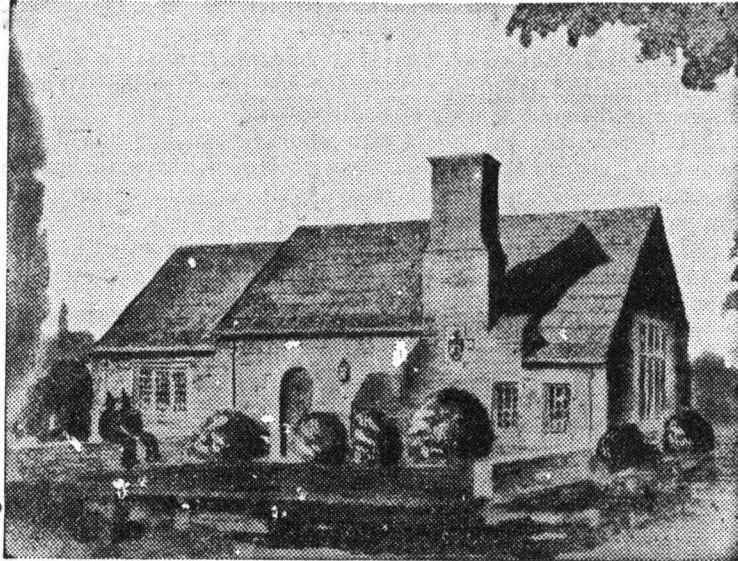
intelligence tests such as the Stanford-Binet, Strong vocational test, and the American Council test, which is used at Southwestern. "These tests can be used to get the individual's principal strength and he can be advised accordingly."

Dr. Robertson stated that he was in favor of intercollegiate athletics, but was decidedly in favor of having them supplemented to the health program. He advocated having the college doctor have the final say-so whether an athlete could participate, rather than the coach who might be too set on winning to consider the future health of the boy.

"Right now," according to Dr. Robertson, "large colleges such as Columbia know more about the personnel of

HONOR COUNCIL AMENDS RULES

To Deal With All Phases Of Campus Honor

Because of recent incidences of dishonesty on the campus, the Honor Council wishes to emphasize the fact that a spirit and tradition of honesty pervades all phases of campus life.

In accordance with this wish, and in order to make each student more conscious of his obligation to see that not only he, but all other students uphold Southwestern's high tradition, the Honor Council has seen fit to amend its Constitution as follows:

"The purpose of this body shall be to foster the honor spirit at Southwestern. It shall have the power to try any member of the student body of Southwestern accused of employing dishonest methods or practices in academic pursuits or other phases of campus life."

This action of the Honor Council marks no great change in the relationships between student and student, or between student and administration. Each member of the student body has already signed a pledge to give full and hearty support to the Honor System of student government. The amendment to the Constitution is a result of the conviction held by both the Honor Council and the administration that the broadening of the council's powers will give to Southwestern a truer and more perfect system of Honor government.

All students enrolled in Southwestern are eligible to compete.

Members of the faculty will act as judges. All manuscripts are to be submitted without names.

Dr. Robertson Opines On College Students

their institutions than smaller ones." He attributes this to scientific testing and record keeping, and looks to the smaller college to wield a great influence when they learn to use scientific procedure in recording individual cases.

He advocates that colleges quit copy-

ing each other's faults and determine a definite policy as to what its students should know and do. He has followed this procedure at Goucher and has determined the following policy for more than 600 young women there:

1. Maintenance of health, both physical and mental.
2. Ability to comprehend and express themselves in their mother tongue.
3. Master art of consumption of time, money and effort. This follows Roosevelt's economic policy, which

states that we must now learn to consume, as we have mastered the art of manufacturing and distribution.

4. Aesthetic appreciation.
5. Understand environment through aid of natural sciences.
6. Master art of getting along with people.
7. Understand universe and God to the best of human ability.

Dr. Robertson went on to stress the importance of instilling will as well as skill into pupils, and emphasized

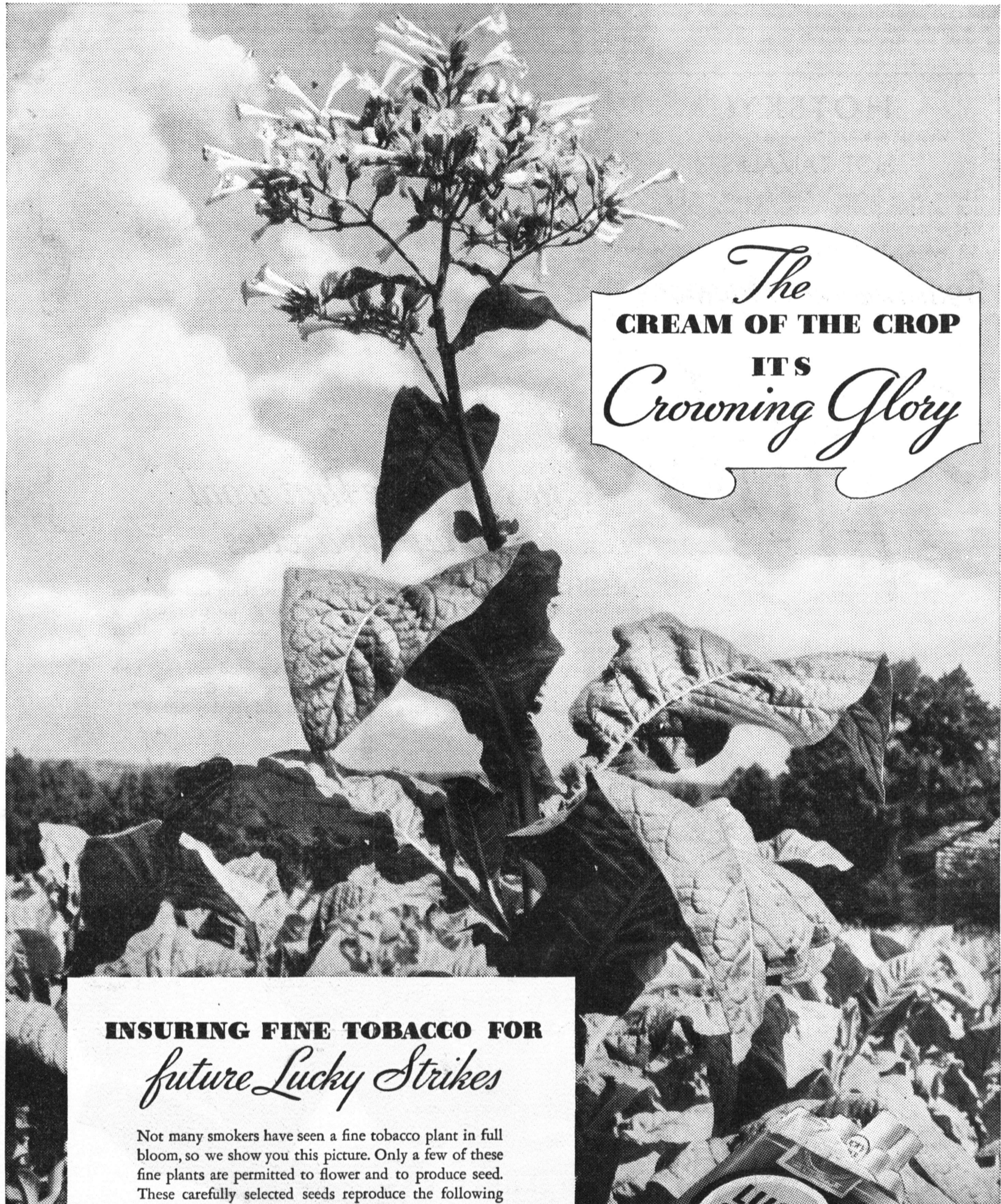
the fact that all influences should be considered in every case.

At Goucher, a round table discussion is held before any student is dismissed for academic deficiencies. If the case can be remedied, that is done rather than expulsion. Opinions of the dean, doctor, education professor, who has charge of the tests, and others who contact the pupil are sought.

Any interesting fact of such cases lies in the stress Dr. Robertson places on the opinions of the English profes-

sors. He claims that themes are largely auto-biographical and that they shed much light on the type of person the student is.

Dr. Robertson concluded by asserting that the "flaming youth" era is definitely past. He finds the young women at Goucher are very serious about their work and have no use for collegiate rah rahism. He believes that this is largely due to the fact they realize the sacrifice someone is making to keep them in school.
