Newton, McGaughran, High, Barnes Leave for Tuscaloosa

Coach John Miller and four Lynx athletes left early this morning for the Southwestern A. A. U. track meet which will be held at Tuscaloosa, Ala., tomorrow.

Newton will be entered in the 440 dash and broad jump. High will race in the 100 and 880 dashes. McGaughran will enter the two mile run. Barnes will high jump and pole vault.

Southwestern made a very creditable showing in the A. A. U. meet at the Capstone last year. Clark Porteous took second place in the mile, bowing to Chauncey Stout, the Southern champion from U. T. "Chicken" High was third in the 880, finishing close behind Osman and Wolfe, of Presbyterian and Tennessee, respectively.

Leading athletes from both the Southern and the new Southeastern conferences participate in this meet. If the Lynx manage to capture a first place, it will mean that the fortunate athlete who wins the gold medal is about the best man in the South in his particular event.

### JUNIORS LEAD ON SCIENCE TEST

The general science section of the Cooperative Tests which were taken last week by the Lynx students, shows that the average member of the junior class is more adequately informed on science than the average member of the senior and sophomore classes.

Miss Linnie Sue Gary, who is in charge of the grading of the tests, announced the following averages: Sophomore average, 34 plus; Junior average, 44 plus; Senior average, 37 plus.

The highest individual score was made by a member of the senior class who amassed 125 points. The lowest grade among the seniors was three points. The highest Junior grade was 122 and the lowest, 11. Ninety-three was the leading mark in the Sophomore division with a low mark of three.

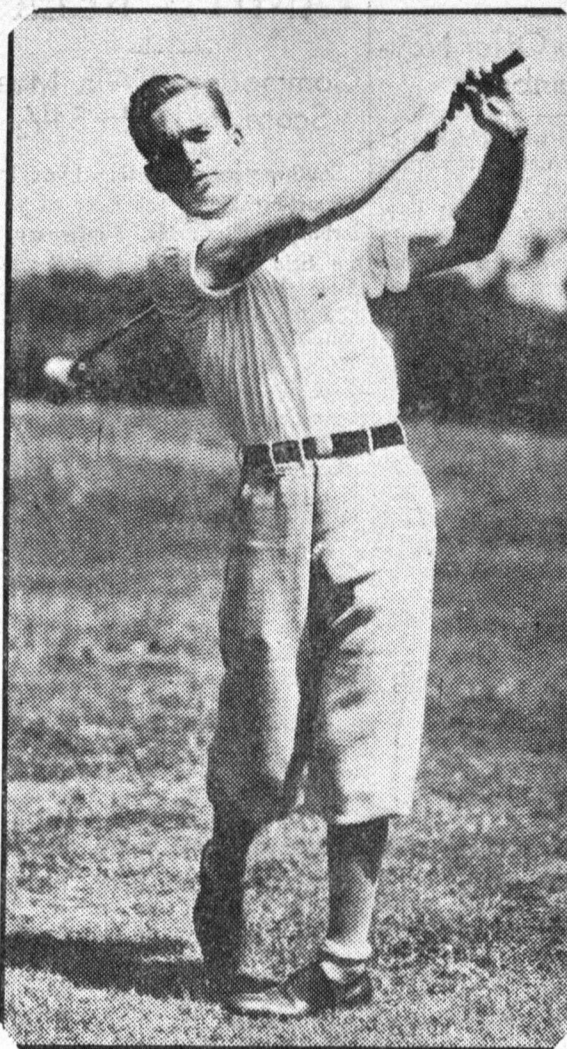
