SHAKEUP MAY REMOVE THREE FACULTY MEN

Finances May Cause Number of Profs To Be Reduced

Dr. Charles Diehl has announced that three professors may not be re-elected to the Southwestern faculty next year because of stringent retrenchment which has been necessitated in the finances of the school.

Dr. Diehl stated further that this was not at all definite, but that letters had been written to three members of the faculty in order to protect them and give them an opportunity to secure another position for next year. There is a chance that all three of the men may be back next year, if the financial situation becomes re-adjusted to any extent.

Reports that Prof. George McLean was fired because of Communistic activities were declared to be absolutely false by Dr. Diehl, who went on to say that he knew nothing of Dr. McLean's religious or political beliefs except that he is an excellent christian, and the son of Judge McLean of Winona, Miss., who is an elder in the Presbyterian Church.

The names of the other two professors who were notified by Dr. Diehl were not divulged, as the president considered the matter confidential and to be released only by the professors themselves if they so desired.

The picture will hang in the new S. A. E. lodge on the campus. John D. Martin will be toastmaster for the banquet.

COOPERATION IS DESIRED

The College Supply Store is trying an experiment this week to see if the students are willing to cooperate with the store in doing something for the benefit of the students. The store has reduced the price of cigarettes to 15 cents per package. The manager reduced the price with the hope of getting enough volume of trade to warrant the reduction.

The students of the college can now buy their cigarettes as cheaply at the college store as they can at other places in Memphis. The store would appreciate the patronage of the students. It is just as easy to buy from an organization which is trying to foster the interests of the students as it is to buy from a place which does not have the interest of Southwestern at heart.

The manager of the store has agreed to reduce the price for one week, and if the sales of cigarettes justify the lower price, then this price will be maintained. However, if the students do not cooperate with the store then the former price will be adhered to.

This article is not written with the purpose of trying to force students to buy from the College Supply Store, but with the idea that a better spirit of cooperation between the students and the store will be a benefit to both parties. This is the students' chance to show whether they appreciate the efforts of the store.

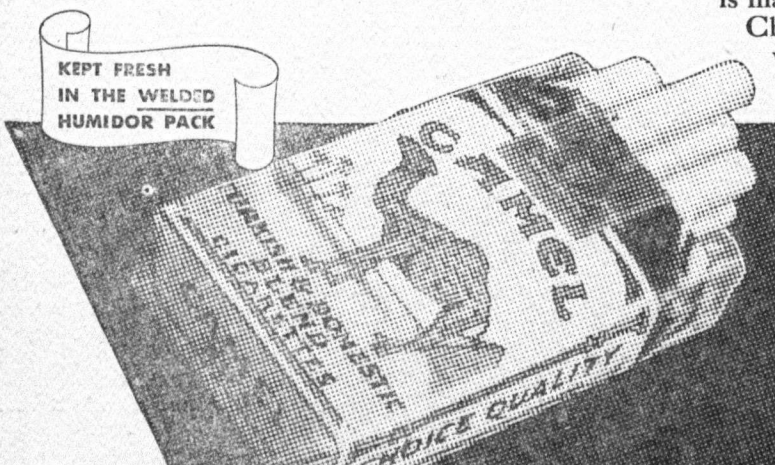
