Women have lacked the impetus to achievement that an honorary fraternity provides for some years now. Alpha Theta here and Greenwood. 50 cents reward Phi is the single organization of this nature open to women, and for information as to their whereit recognizes ability only in the scholastic field. This situation abouts. George Humphreys. seems pitiable, indeed, when compared with the honorary groups for men which exist on the campus. Tau Kappa Alpha and Sigma Upsilon recognize literary ability, Chi Beta Phi rewards attainment in the scientific field, the Forensic Society commends debating skill, and the "S" Club recognizes athletic proficiency. Distinctive leadership and outstanding achievement are rewarded by Omicron Delta Kappa.

Surely Southwestern women should be entitled to have a chapter of Mortar Board or Cap and Gown, one of which every institution of any note boasts. The loss of Cap and Gown has had a marked effect upon the interest in extra-curricular attainment among women students, and we believe that, if re-granted this privilege, Southwestern women would be able to use it more wisely. Sorority prejudices could be eliminated by the proposed point system. This method would regulate the membership requirements which include creditable, if not honor roll, scholarship.
