Dr. Harvey Branscomb, chancellor of Vanderbilt University, delivered the annual Phi Beta Kappa address at Southwestern at 8 p.m. Thursday, March 24, in the Adult Education Center of Burrow Library.

His address was the culmination of the initiation ceremony for the five new student members and three alumni honorary members of Southwestern's Gamma of Tennessee Chapter of the national honor scholastic fraternity.

Initiation ceremonies for members only were held at 5:30 p.m. in the Directors' Room at Southwestern, with the presentation of the keys, and were followed by a dinner at 6:15 in Neely Hall, to which both chapter members and associates (Phi Beta Kappas of Memphis and vicinity) were invited.

Honorary Members Named

Southwestern seniors to be initiated were James Aydelotte, 1789 Linden; James Thompson, 972-N. Willett; Miss Johnnie Sudduth, 3158 Spottswood; Miss Mary Margaret Storck, of Cincinnati, Ohio; and Miss Mary Rodriguez, of Monroe, Louisiana. Southwestern alumni who were named honorary members, are Judge John Webb Green, oldest living alumnus, Class of '79, still actively engaged in the practice of law in Knoxville, Tennessee, an author of "Lives of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Tennessee, Law and Lawyers," and other works; Dr. William Fridell Orr, Class of '28, professor of systematic theology at Western Seminary, Pittsburg; Dr. John A. Redhead, pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina, preacher, the National Radio Pulpit, NBC, and author of theological works.

Four-Hour Costume Ball to Feature Justice and Mahannah Orchestras

The traditional April Fool festivities, including chiefly the traditional April Fool Play, followed by the traditional April Fool dance, will ensue next Friday, April 1st. These events, are, in many ways, the highlights of the entire school year.

From 7:30 to 9:00 P.M., the April Fool Play, "We're Graduates" will be presented. The Dance will begin at 10:00 P.M., and will break up at 2:00 in the morning. Tickets for the dance and the play may be had for the very reasonable fee of \$2.00, stag or drag.

Two Bands

The dance will feature the music of two bands: Jimmie Mahannah and Bill Justis. Each band will play for thirty minutes, with one taking up where the other leaves off. This process will continue throughout the evening, thus eliminating anything resembling an intermission. Dixieland music will be prominently featured during the evening, and about every fourth dance will be "backwards" with the girls breaking instead of the boys.

Big Prizes

Prizes will be given for the best girl's costume, the best boy's costume, the best couple's costume, and the best group's costumes. In addition, prizes will be awarded to the girls who have dates with Buck Wade, Jim Gillis, and Andy Gandy.

Decorations for the dance have not been definitely decided upon, but will be similar to those used last year except, said Social Chairman Joe Eades, ". . . no nails in the walls."

Sophomore Wins \$250 Music Prize

Harrylyn Graves placed second in the recent Memphis and Mid-South Piano Scholarship Association's annual competition. Contestants were entered from three states: Mississippi, Tennessee, and Arkansas. Four finalists remained after the first elimination; and after final selections first and second place winners were chosen. Josephine Lee Jared of Nashville won the first prize of \$500 to be used in the furtherance of her music studies. Harrylyn played four selections to take the second prize \$250 music scholarship. S'western Host To European Scholars

This week Southwestern played host to two very formidable scholars from Germany. These gentlemen are Mr. Ferdinand Meyn of Hambrug, and Dr. Adolph M. Daeumling of Munich, both of whom are touring the United States for two months under the sponsorship of the American Council on Education.

The American Council on Education, among its other functions, sponsors these tours in order to give outstanding European educators and others in similar positions the opportunity to see first hand American modes of educational activities and community activities. While here in Memphis, these two gentlemen were explicitly interested in gaining a "general picture of an American Community," said Dr. Lawrence F. Kinney, who conducted the Europeans on their various excursions during their three day visit here.

Mr. Meyn

Mr. Ferdinand Meyn is a school principal and director of adult education in Hamburg, Germany. He was trained in the Teachers Training College in Hamburg. His primary interests are in adult and rural education. He expressed a wish especially to visit agricultural communities, including various types of farming and different form organizations and activities of rural youth. He also said that he would like to visit all types of educational institutions with some time in a relatively small liberal arts college.

Dr. Daeumling

Dr. Adolf M. Daeumling is the Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Munich, Germany. He holds a Ph. D. degree in psychology from the University of Munich, and did special studies in

Psychotherapy in Berlin and Munich. Dr. Daeumling expressed interests in Applied Psychology, social worker's activities, religious activities, and a general picture of American life. Both men possess an excellent knowledge of English.

During their stay in Memphis, the two men attended classes both at Southwestern and at Memphis State, both for the purpose of viewing our educational techniques and to answer questions from interested students. They expressed surprise at the informality of the American classroom, stating that except for small seminars, the German classroom lecture was a very formal affair.

Tea Guests

The two visiting scholars were guests of honor at a tea which was given Monday afternoon in the faculty lounge of Burrow Library. In attendance at this tea were members of the Free World Issues Committee, the International Relations Club, the psychology and political science departments, and other interested persons.

During their tour, the two men visited East High School, to see an example of all twelve grades housed under one roof. They were guests for lunch of the local Rotary Club on Tuesday, after which they visited a cotton brokerage firm and Sears, Roebuck. That evening they participated in a discussion on the rearmament of Germany.

Dr. Daeumling and Mr. Meyn left by plane last Wednesday for their next stop, which is Albuquerque, New Mexico.

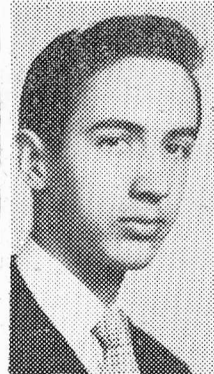

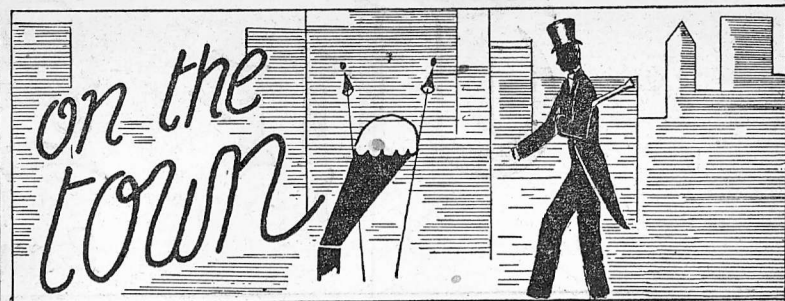

Among other things, you'll get a chance to see Jim Eikner as a one-note trumpeter with bright red hair.

The Best Movie

The best movie in town this week is at the State. Filmed in 1936 (only a couple of years before GONE WITH THE WIND), CAMILLE stars Greta Garbo in one of the most unutterably beautiful romances you'll ever see. A very young Robert Taylor plays her lover. CAMILLE is not a movie to miss.

At the Ritz is CANGACEIRO ("The Bandit"), a Brazilian film concerning a band of murderous back-country cut throats; it features an unusual musical score by Gabriel Migliovi. Also on the bill is a British comedy, THE HORSE'S MOUTH, which is about an Oracle who lives at the bottom of an Irish well and dispenses Truth to all who ask for it. Highly Praised Film

The highly praised film THE COUNTRY GIRL is showing at the Malco. It's many, many small flaws do not keep its triangle from being an interesting and unusual one, and Grace Kelly, Bing Crosby, and William Holden give generally fine performances. It's much better than average, and if you don't think too much about what it could have been, I think you'll like it. Judy Garland deserves the Academy Award.

Victor Mature plays the title role in CHIEF CRAZY HORSE at the Palace. If you like movies about Custer's Last Stand, you'll love this.

Heaven only knows what the Warner will be showing, but chances are it will either be NEW YORK CONFIDENTIAL or CRASHOUT, both of which are crime melodramas.

YWCA's Centennial

Her visit to Southwestern comes during the YWCA's Centennial, which is being celebrated in 1955 by YWCAs throughout the United States and in the 64 other countries around the world where the Association is active today.

Miss Hildebrand's job will be to inform young women of the expanding program of the organization and the need for trained personnel.

"The National Headquarters of the YWCA has received more than 100 requests for YW programs in brand new communities within the past year," she said. "Such staff members will have interesting and varied experiences, working with people of different religions, national and racial cultures and economic backgrounds; they can be assured of professional advancement and the challenge of a creative career which can be combined with marriage. They will also have an opportunity to be of great service to the community."
