WHO'S WHO CHOOSES TWELVE

Top Seniors Win Acclaim For All-Around Excellence

Twelve Southwestern Seniors have been selected to "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities," a national publication for 1955-1956. Those chosen are Smokey Russell, Joe Eades, Ann Barr, Dot Henning, Gerald Smith, Robin Sprague, Tom Tosh, Jip Walters, Sallie Myhr Thomas, Joan Womack, Marcia Calmer, and Sue Carter.

These twelve were selected by a vote of the student council as being the most outstanding in this year's senior class in all phases of college work. The candidates were chosen on four qualifications: (1) excellence and sincerity in scholarship; (2) leadership and participation in extracurricular activities; (3) citizenship and service to the college; and (4) promise of future. Campus Maid of Cotton Will Be Chosen Nov. 18

The Sou'wester Maid of Cotton contest will be held next Friday night at 8:00 in Hardie Auditorium. The preliminary contest has been set at 4:30 that afternoon, when all entrants will meet and talk with the judges. That night the contestants, dressed in formals, will each make a 3 minute speech about "Why I Would Like to be Maid of Cotton."

After the speeches, there will be an intermission while the judges choose the finalists. Mr. Talent, Bill Teague, and Miss Talent, Ann E. Art, will entertain the audience at that time.

From the five finalists presented after the intermission, three winners, Southwestern's Maid of Cotton and two alternates, will be chosen. The winners will receive bouquets of red roses and the Maid of Cotton will be presented with a trophy. Malcolm Whatley will act as Master of Ceremonies and Mary Lewis Myatt, last year's winner, is directing the contest.

All entrants are asked to meet in Hardie tomorrow (Saturday) at 1:00, for practice on the stage and draw numbers for order of appearance Friday night.

Synod Begins Fund Campaign

For the purpose of obtaining \$250,000 for Southwestern at Memphis and \$150,000 for the Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, the Synod of Alabama is putting on an extensive fund raising campaign.

The campaign began on Sept. 1, and will continue through Nov. 30. Mr. Ralph L. Miker, a representative for Ward, Dreshman, and Reinhardt of New York City, is managing the campaign.

To acquaint the members of the five presbyteries of Alabama with the operation, six rallies have been held. They were held on Oct. 10th at Decatur, on Oct. 11th at Birmingham, on Oct. 12th at Mobile, on Oct. 13th at Greensboro, on Oct. 17th at Dothan, and Oct. 18th at Montgomery.

The rallies were supper meetings and lasted from 5:30 to 9:00 p. m. Speeches of inspiration as well as information were given. Dr. Peyton N. Rhodes, Dr. R. P. Richardson, Dean Jameson Jones, and Mrs. John Q. Wolf from Southwestern and Dr. Frank H. Caldwell from Louisville Seminary attended the rallies.

Thus far the campaign is very successful and it is hoped that the goal will be reached by the appointed date.

Seniors Perform With Orchestra

The Southwestern Orchestra will be presented in its first concert of the present season on Tuesday, November 15th. Hardie Auditorium on Southwestern's campus will be the scene and the hour is set as 8:15. Dr. Burnet C. Tuthill, director of Southwestern's music department, will conduct.

The program will feature three members of the senior class as soloists. Harrylyn Graves, pianist, of Greenville, Miss., will start the proceedings by playing the Bach concerto in D minor with the strings of the orchestra. After intermission, Ada Jane Walters of Memphis, another pianist, will be heard in the first movement of the Schumann piano concerto. The third soloist will be Marian Cobb of Memphis, whose harp will be featured in the solo cadenza in overture to Mignon by Amroise Thomas, which closes the program.

In addition to these works the orchestra will also play the Haydn Symphony, number 104, in D major, the one known as the London Symphony, and the Danse Macabre by Camille Saint Saens.

Science Foundation Awards Fellowships

The National Science Foundation has announced its plans to award approximately 700 graduate and 80 postdoctoral fellowships for scientific study during the 1956-1957 academic year.

They are offered in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological, engineering, and other sciences, including anthropology, psychology (other than clinical), geography, and certain interdisciplinary fields. Fields of convergence between the natural and social sciences are included this year for the first time.

Graduate fellowships are available to those who are studying for either masters' or doctoral degrees at the first year, intermediate or terminal year levels. College seniors who expect to receive a baccalaureate degree during the 1955-1956 academic year are also eligible to apply.

All applicants for graduate (pre-doctoral) awards will be required to take an examination designed to test scientific aptitude and achievement. This examination, administered by the Educational Testing Service, will be given on January 21, 1956, at designated centers throughout the United States and certain foreign countries. Selection of graduate Fellows will be based on examination scores, academic records and recommendations regarding each candidate's abilities.

Applications for postdoctoral fellowships must be received in the Fellowship Office of the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council by December 19, 1955, and for graduate fellowships by January 3, 1956.

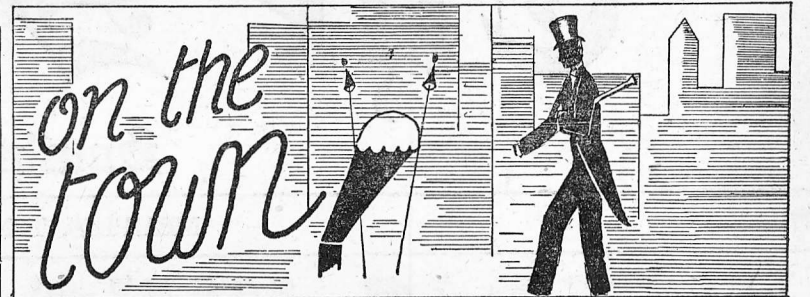

Aida, with all the oranges and aquas, is being held over at the Ritz. I hear OHELLO, a la Orson Welles, is coming soon.

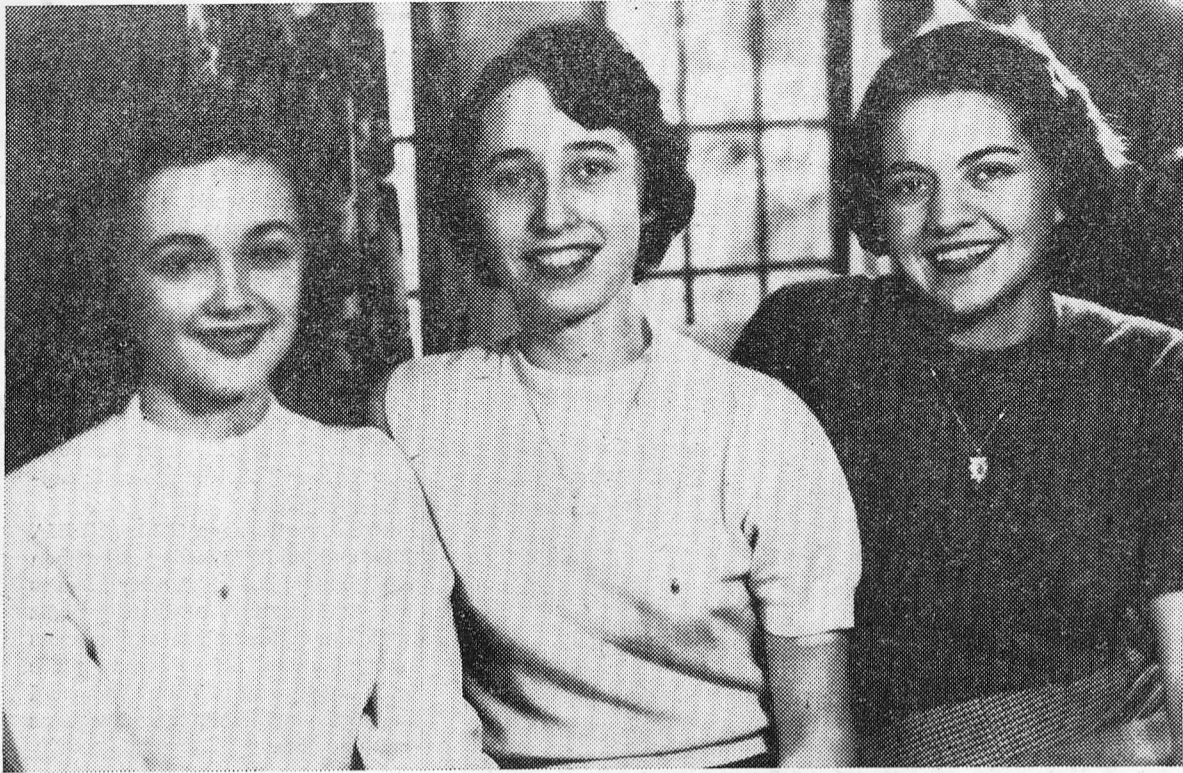

Southwestern Beauty 1947 Maid of Cotton

Eight years ago, Southwestern's Hilma Seay was chosen national Maid of Cotton. Today, as Southwestern entrants prepare for the campus contest, many of them are unaware that a Maid of Cotton was once chosen from our own co-eds.

Miss Seay, now Mrs. Billy Marks Hightower, came to Southwestern as a freshman in 1943. She had attended Miss Hutchison's School and was graduated from Ward-Belmont in Nashville. Majoring in music at Southwestern, she was an outstanding co-ed. She pledged Alpha Omicron Pi and was chosen to S.T.A.B. her freshman year. She was chosen Most Attractive Co-ed and was a member of the April Fool Court and a Lynx Beauty every year she attended Southwestern.

Hilma, who was a senior when she was chosen Maid of Cotton, was the first Maid to go to France. Her tour began in Miami on February 17, 1947, after a month's training in New York's Harry Conover Model Agency. She visited Paris and the French Riviera, armed with a lavish display of cotton fashions designed by 19 leading American dress designers.

Modeled Cottons

As an official representative of the cotton industry, she modeled her cotton wardrobe for French dress designers and buyers. She also toured 17 American cities, and posed for thousands of fashion photographs. She was accompanied by Mary Allie Taylor, Press-Scimitar staff writer, on the tour.

When she completed her tour, Hilma was honored by the King and Queen of the Memphis Cotton Carnival at the Grand Carnival Ball. Our talented Maid of Cotton also gave a command performance as a concert singer at the Cottonland Music Festival that spring. After her six month's reign, she returned to Southwestern to complete the requirements for a Bachelor of Music degree.

"Be Natural"

Mrs. Hightower says she will always treasure the wonderful experience of being Maid of Cotton and advises this year's contestants just to be natural and to enjoy themselves.

Next Friday night, the Maid of Cotton for 1955 may walk across the stage in Hardie Auditorium. With Hilma Seay Hightower, former Maid of Cotton, and last year's winner and one of the twenty finalists in the national contest, Mary Lewis Myatt, as precedents, Southwestern should again make a good showing.

Sou'wester Sponsors 6th Maid of Cotton Contest

When Southwestern's Maid of Cotton is selected this year, you can be sure that she will be a good representative, if we may judge by our past selections. In 1949 when the Sou'wester sponsored the first contest here on campus, the beauty selected was Anne "Pooh" Caldwell, who is now our assistant dean of women. She was then a junior from Louisville, Kentucky, and was representing the Tri Deltas. Backing her up were AOPi Barbara Flippin, first alternate, and Jean Arnold sponsored by Kappa Alpha, as second alternate.

McSpadden Wins

In 1951, a former roommate of a national Maid of Cotton, took the Southwestern title over 22 contestants. Chi Omega Jane McSpadden roomed in New York a few days with Libba McGee, the Maid of 1950. Close behind her in the contest were Anne Freemater, Tri Delt, and Joan Stewart, AOPi.

The Kappa Alphas sponsored another winner in 1952, when Anne Hebert of Lake Charles copped the trophy and the right to represent Southwestern in the national contest. KD Marilyn Mitchell and Tri-Delt Margaret Jones were her alternates.

'55 Winners

The winners for the '55 contest, were a blonde, brunette and a redhead. Blonde Esther Jane Swartzfager, "Poochie," was the Maid, attended by brunette Marian Cobb and redhead Jackie Coker.

Last year, Chi O's Mary Lewis Myatt was Southwestern's Maid of Cotton. Marcia Calmer represented SAE fraternity as first alternate, and Marian Cobb won second alternate for the KAs.

Whoever is chosen this year as Southwestern's Maid of Cotton may know that she has some mighty fine predecessors to follow as examples!

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The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given at 200 testing centers throughout the United States on Saturday, February 11, 1956.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in Professional Information, General Culture, English Expression, and Non-verbal Reasoning; and one or two of ten Optional Examinations designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught.

The college which a candidate is attending, or the school system in which he is seeking employment, will advise him whether he should take the National Teacher Examinations and which of the Optional Examinations to select.

Application forms and a Bulletin of Information describing registration procedure and containing sample test questions may be obtained from college officials, school superintendents, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, New Jersey.

Completed applications, accompanied by proper examination fees, will be accepted by the ETS office during November and December, and in January so long as they are received before January 13, 1956.

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
