The Singers and Their Director

"The chorus, pretty as a picture . . . showed every evidence of excellent training. The diction was a joy and the Latin text posed no difficulties."

Such was the enthusiastic comment of Francis A. Klein, music critic of the St. Louis *Globe-Democrat*, when the Southwestern Singers, numbering eighty-odd, appeared in that city under the baton of the famed Vladimir Golschmann, conductor of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. The phrases, "tonally resplendent," "deeply reverent," and "imbued with a spirituality that sprang from within," were also used by Mr. Klein to describe the Singer's interpretation of Faure's *Requiem*.

This was not the first honor of its kind to come to the talented group. In the spring of 1952 came the first invitation to appear with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. The Singers acquitted themselves so well that the second invitation followed. They also appeared with the Memphis Sinfonietta last Spring.

First organized in 1935 by Dr. Burnet C. Tuthill, Director of Music at Southwestern, the *a cappella* choir has grown from an original membership of eighteen until it now numbers some eighty-five. In 1939 the Singers began making annual tours to present concerts of sacred music in Presbyterian churches and in the high schools of Southern states. During recent years the Singers have given spring concerts of large choral works—the Bach *Mass in B minor*, the Mozart *Requiem*, Handel's *Dettingen Te Deum*—and, at the Christmas season, cantatas by J. S. and J. C. Bach and Schuetz. In addition, the Singers have made an album of recordings of works by Palestrina, Byrd, Brahms, William Schuman, and others.

Dr. Tuthill, under whose inspired direction the Singers have achieved remarkable success, is himself a distinguished composer and conductor. His numerous compositions for symphony orchestra and for band have been performed in New York, Cleveland, Cincinnati, New Orleans, St. Louis, and other cities, Dr. Tuthill having frequently been invited to serve as conductor for them. His Suite for Band won the Columbia University Prize for 1947 and, later in the year, was played in the Eastman School Festival of American Music. His Come Seven Rhapsody (Opus 11) was recently recorded in Vienna by the American Recording Society, and his Clarinet Concerto with Orchestra was performed last year by the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Recent publications are his Suite for Band and Rowdy Dance by the C. F. Summy Company of Chicago, and Psalm Three by Carl Fischer Inc. of New York City. Dr. Tuthill also has a weekly radio program of recorded music over Station WHHM of Memphis.
