HOME COMING PLANNED FOR OCTOBER 18

PROMINENT ACCOUNTANT JOINS FACULTY

The addition of Mr. W. B. Castenholz to the Southwestern faculty as Professor of Accounting was announced only a few days before the opening of the present term.

Nationally known as a certified public accountant and as an educator in the field of accounting, Prof. Castenholz's work this year will be largely in the Evening College Division. He will offer an evening course in Principles of Accounting, one in Advanced Accounting and Auditing, and one in Cost Accounting.

A twenty-five week C.P.A. review course will be organized in November for those preparing for the Certified Public Accountant examinations which will be given in May, 1942.

The addition of a man with the prestige which Mr. Castenholz has in the field of accountancy will make possible the development of a much more comprehensive program of courses in Business Administration at Southwestern. The organization of work leading to the degree with a major in accounting is contemplated as part of this development.

Professor Castenholz has a long and outstanding record both as a certified public accountant and as an author and educator in the field of accountancy.

He served for some time on the faculties of the Universities of Illinois and Wisconsin. Later he was connected with the LaSalle Extension University in Chicago as Director of the Department of Higher Accountancy in the correspondence division, and as Dean of the residence school. He has been Educational Director and Vice-President of the American Academy of Accountancy, and Educational Director and President of the Accountancy Training Institute. A number of the texts used by these three institutions were written by Mr. Castenholz.

In business, Prof. Castenholz was for some time Comptroller of the University of Illinois. He was also Auditor and Assistant Treasurer of the American Milling Co., Peoria, Illinois.

DR. MILLARD ON COLLEGE BOARD

Dr. John W. Millard, '20, pastor of the Evergreen Presbyterian Church, Memphis, was elected a Director of Southwestern to represent the Synod of Mississippi at a meeting of that Synod in Jackson, Mississippi, recently.

Dr. Millard served as President of the Southwestern Alumni Association in 1936.

Azalea Garden On Campus Is Memorial to Mr. Hubert Fisher

All friends of Southwestern will be interested in the campus beautification project which is being made possible by a generous gift from Mrs. Hubert Fisher, Germantown, Tennessee. In October, Mrs. Fisher will establish on the campus a beautiful garden of 2500 azaleas. The garden is being created as a memorial to Mrs. Fisher's late husband.

Planting of the garden will be under the direction of Mr. Paul Mueller, well known Memphis landscape architect.

EVENING CLASSES ATTRACT MANY

An enrollment of approximately 200 in evening classes at Southwestern is indicated in preliminary reports from the Registrar's office.

The number of Memphians taking advantage of the evening classes has increased each year since Evening College Division was established several years ago.

Courses in Accounting, Chemistry, Public Speaking, Languages, English, Mathematics, Philosophy, and International Relations are proving popular with evening students this year. A substantial enrollment in the class in Opera Music is also anticipated.

All Evening College Classes are being held on the campus this year rather than in down town classrooms.

Sewanee Game and Alumni Dinner; Party in Evening

The annual Southwestern Homecoming is scheduled for Saturday, October 18 this year. Every former student and graduate of Southwestern is urged to attend the football game with Sewanee in Crump Stadium on that afternoon.

Following the game there will be open house on the campus. Faculty members will meet old grads in the social room in Palmer Hall. Fraternity and sorority lodges will be decorated and open to old members.

The homecoming dinner will be held in the Gym at 6:30. Alumni will be guests of the Alumni Association. Having the dinner in the gymnasium rather than in the college dining hall will assure against the overcrowding which was experienced at last year's Homecoming banquet and at the Alumni Day dinner last June.

The day's festivities will close with a party. This event, scheduled to last from 9 until 12, will also be sponsored by the Alumni Association. The place where the party will be held will be announced later.

Air Corps Review Recently Organized At Southwestern

"Keep 'em flying" is the slogan of the Air Corps Institute which was organized recently at Southwestern. Established in connection with the Evening College Division and under the co-sponsorship of the Aviation Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the Institute was organized specifically to give an intensive review course to high school graduates and men with less than two years of college. The review will prepare students for examinations given by the U. S. Army Air Corps to those who wish to become aviation cadets.

English, History and Mathematics are to be covered by the class. Meetings are held four evenings a week, from 7:30 to 9:30.

The Civilian Pilot Training Program which has been given at Southwestern for the past two years is being continued during the present session also. This training is open to men who have had at least two years of college work.
