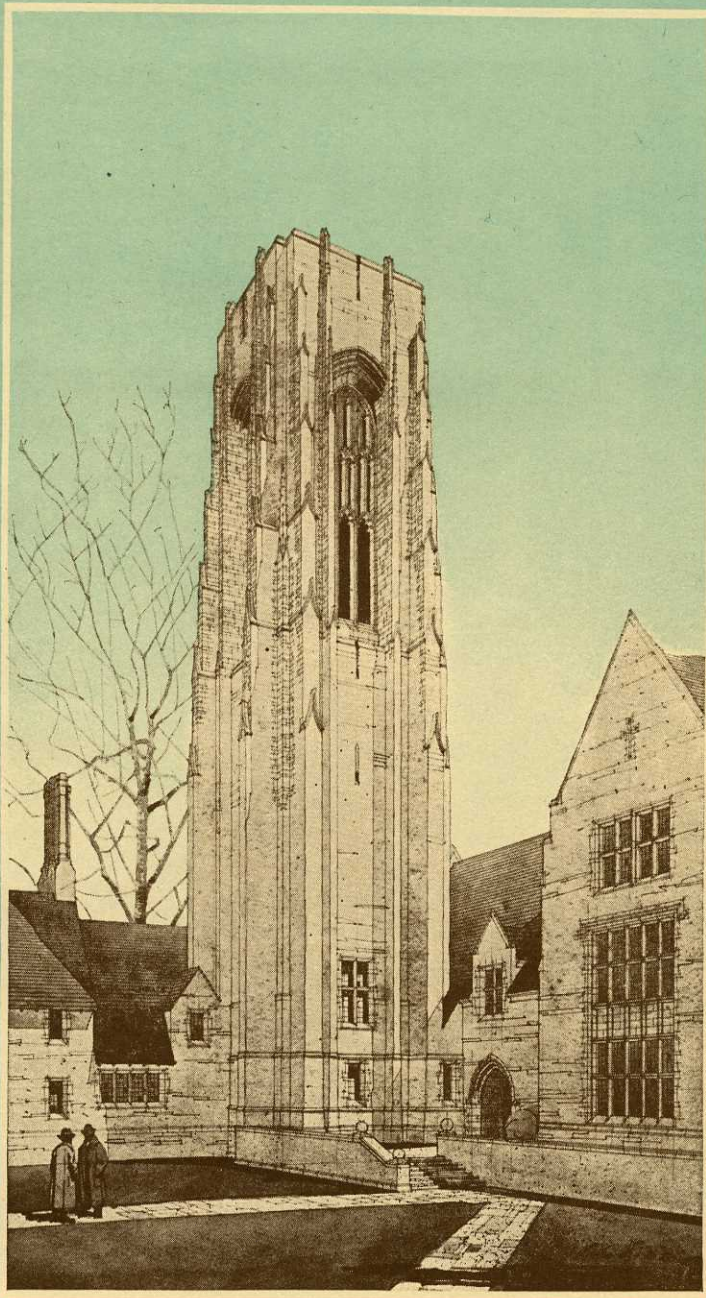


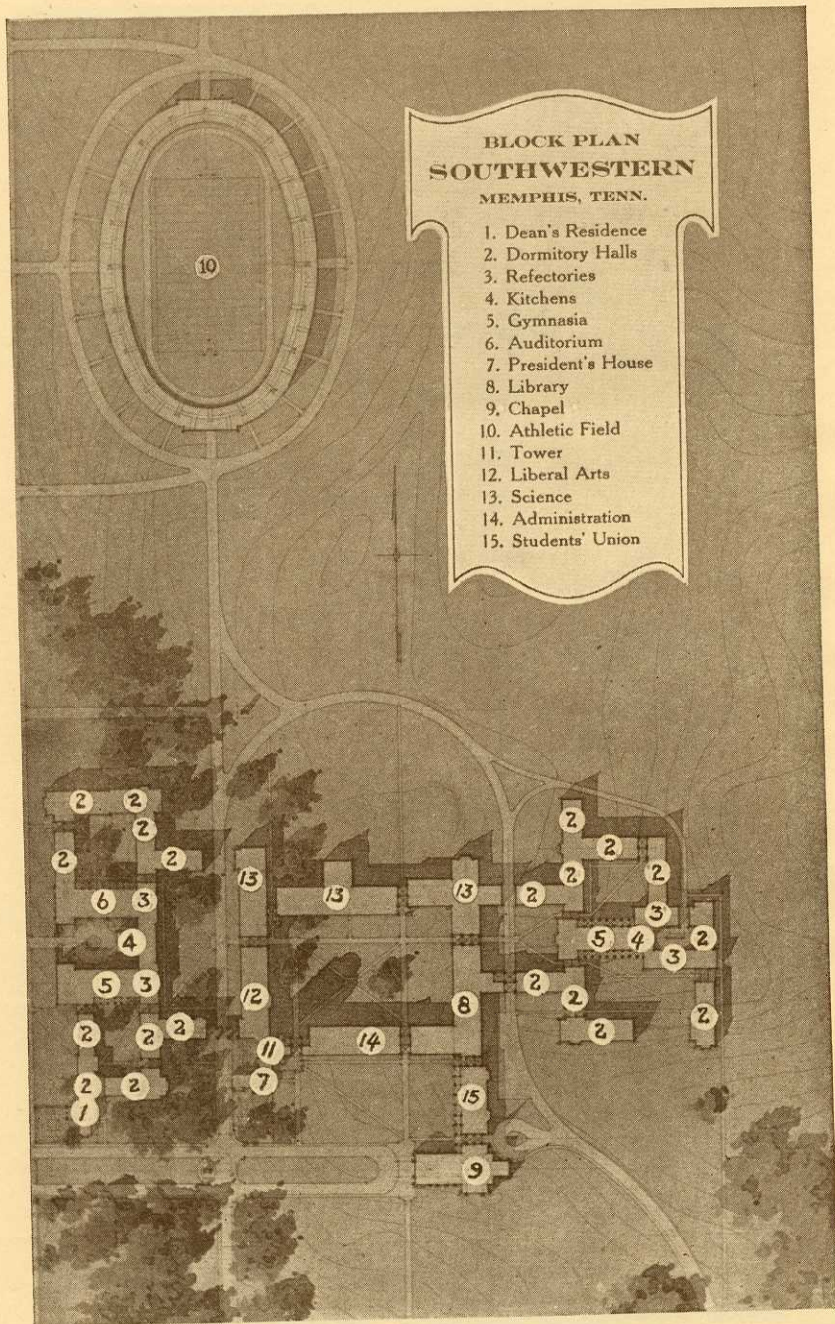

ACCORDING to world leaders the greatest need of the present day is more Christian Education. In the judgment of many, the Southern Presbyterian Church stands for the type of Christian Education which the world most needs.

I. An Unusual Opportunity

(1) An unusual opportunity has come to the Southern Presbyterian Church to establish a standard college of arts and sciences at Memphis, Tennessee. This College will be known as SOUTHWESTERN, the College of the Mississippi Valley. A magnificent site of 124 acres has been secured and buildings are now being erected.

(2) The Church was so impressed with the opportunity afforded that the General Assembly and the controlling Synods, together with the Board of Directors of Southwestern Presbyterian University at Clarksville, Tenn., voted unanimously to combine Southwestern Presbyterian University at Clarksville with the College to be established at Memphis.

(3) When the present location of Southwestern Presbyterian University was selected nearly fifty years ago, the committee on location met at Memphis. The reason Memphis was not selected as the original location was on account of unfavorable health conditions which prevailed at that time. Now, in the providence of God and as a result of education, that handicap has been forever removed, and Memphis is now one of the most healthful cities in the United States.

II. The Strategic Location

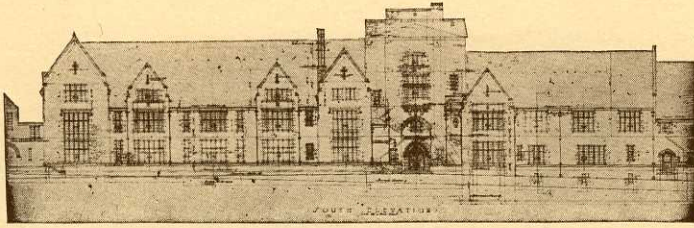
(1) Memphis is the commercial center of a large and fertile area. It is known as the Gateway to the Southwest. It is a great and growing city, destined by its strategic location and by its stalwart citizenship to become one of the most important cities of the land.

(2) There is, however, one great lack, the dearth of institutions of higher education throughout the Mississippi Valley. Nashville, Birmingham, Atlanta, New Orleans, and other Southern cities are educationally well equipped, but Memphis has no college of arts and sciences in it or near it. It is the only city of its size in the country of which this can be said. East Tennessee and Middle Tennessee have numerous colleges, but the lack in West Tennessee is appalling. The consequence is that, though Memphis has an excellent public school system, there are proportionately far fewer young people from this section who are receiving the advantages of a college education. Memphis offers the greatest opportunity in this country for the establishment of a great Christian college, and for the resultant far-reaching service which such an institution will render both to Church and State.

III. Some Reasons for the Undertaking

(1) The prime reason for the new and enlarged project is the unusual opportunity for service in the work of Christian Education such as the Southern Presbyterian Church delights in and for which it stands. In the establishment of Southwestern, the College of the Mississippi Valley, at Memphis, the original purpose of the founders of Southwestern Presbyterian University will be carried out.

(2) The Chamber of Commerce of Memphis carefully investigated this undertaking and gave it unqualified endorsement and hearty co-operation. As a result the people of Memphis have subscribed \$581,000 for the new College. Most of this fund has been paid in and the remainder is being paid.

(3) With this substantial beginning, an appeal was made to Presbyterians in the Mississippi Valley, with the result that \$1,029,000 additional was subscribed. This fund, when fully paid, will provide for the site, architect's plans and some of the buildings essential for a beginning in the new location.

(4) It was recognized that it was most desirable to bring to this unusual location an established and a going institution rather than to multiply institutions by establishing another college. The best service in this important field will be rendered by a college with splendid traditions, with a trained faculty, with a loyal alumni, and an established Church support and Church control. This is fully provided by Southwestern Presbyterian University, which is to be moved from Clarksville to Memphis and combined with Southwestern.

(5) Southwestern Presbyterian University was established more than forty-eight years ago. It has matriculated nearly 6,000 students. This College has filled more than a third of the Presbyterian pulpits of the Southwest. It has furnished more than a fifth of the ministers of the entire Southern Presbyterian Church, and has sent more than 30 missionaries to the foreign field. It has made, through its other distinguished alumni, an even greater contribution to the State.

IV. Pressing Present Needs

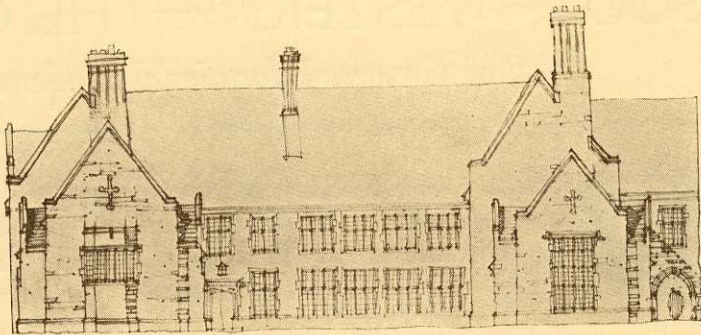
(1) It is planned to open the new SOUTHWESTERN in Memphis, in September, 1924. In the meantime the work of Southwestern Presbyterian University will continue with undiminished energy and efficiency at Clarksville.

(2) An appropriation has been set aside for architect's plans. These plans have been made by Mr. Henry C. Hibbs, Nashville, Tenn., and associated with him are Messrs. Day & Klauder of Philadelphia, and Jones & Furbringer of Memphis.

A wonderful site of 124 acres just across from Overton Park has been secured, a site which for beauty and convenience of location is unexcelled by any college campus in the country.

(3) Provision has also been made for the administration building, which is now in process of erection and which will cost about \$300,000. With the amount necessary for endowment in order to maintain our position as a standard college, together with the cost of the original campaign and expense of publicity and collecting the funds subscribed, considerable additional funds are now needed.

(4) Present pressing needs include three dormitories at a cost of \$60,000 each; the Dining Hall, to cost \$75,000; the Science Building, to cost \$200,000; the President's House, to cost \$25,000, and professors' homes, to cost \$15,000 each.

V. The Appeal

(1) Believing in your interest in the work of Christian Education, and particularly the kind of Christian Education and training provided by the Presbyterian Church, we make this appeal to you. It is our hope that this brief statement will set before you an opportunity for permanent investment for Christian Education in the South in which you will wish to have a share.

(2) Should you be sufficiently interested to be willing to consider providing one of the buildings, mentioned in paragraph four above, as a memorial, we would be most happy to have such support and co-operation from you. The building could be made a memorial, to bear such name as might be indicated.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION is gripping our big business and professional men as no other movement in our times. The big outstanding facts that arrest attention and command loyal support are:

tendency is not arrested and strong moral influences substituted, American free institutions as well as her vast wealth will be imperiled by red revolution or by another world war.

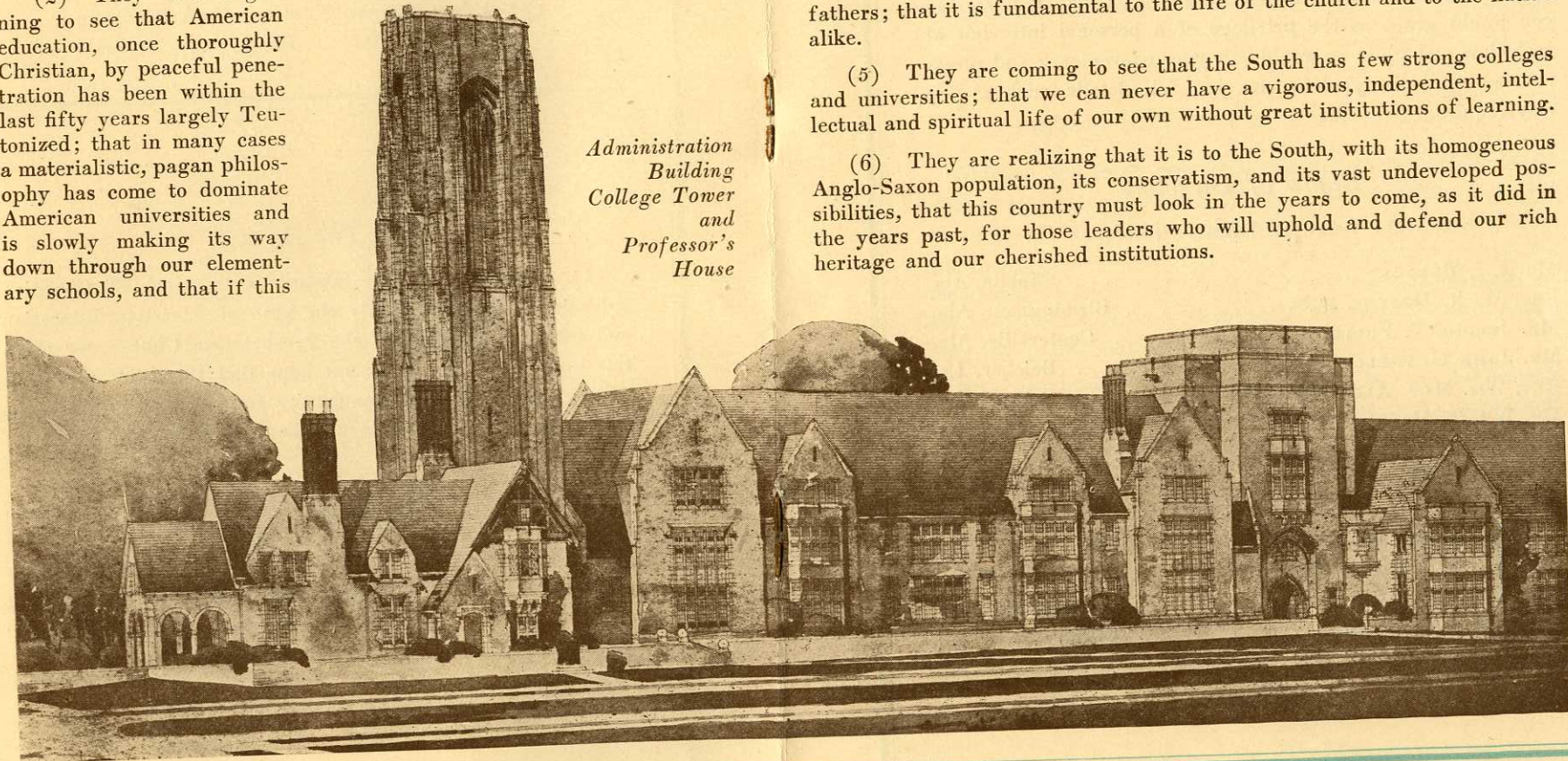
(3) They see that General Pershing was right when, in a recent address, he said that unless we apply higher moral standards to social, industrial and international relations, our civilization will soon reach the point of self-destruction.

(4) They are coming to see that Christian Education in our church, as well as in all Protestant churches, is a great patriotic Americanization movement, to restore to this country the Christian Education of our fathers; that it is fundamental to the life of the church and to the nation alike.

(5) They are coming to see that the South has few strong colleges and universities; that we can never have a vigorous, independent, intellectual and spiritual life of our own without great institutions of learning.

(6) They are realizing that it is to the South, with its homogeneous Anglo-Saxon population, its conservatism, and its vast undeveloped possibilities, that this country must look in the years to come, as it did in the years past, for those leaders who will uphold and defend our rich heritage and our cherished institutions.

House*



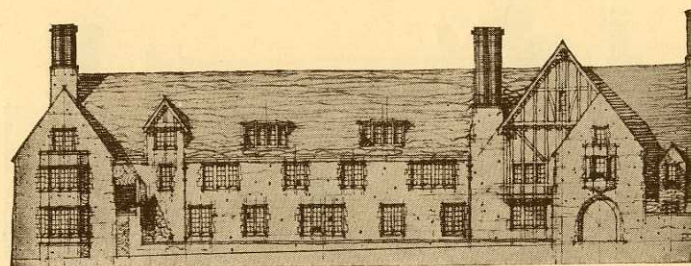

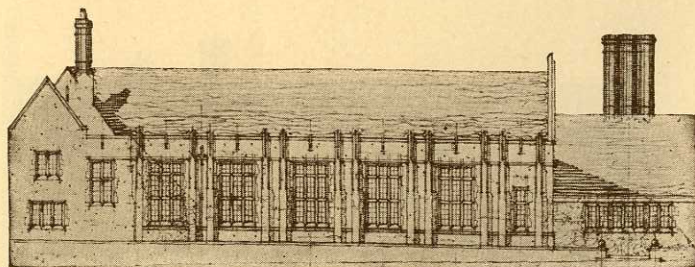

A Leader of Men*

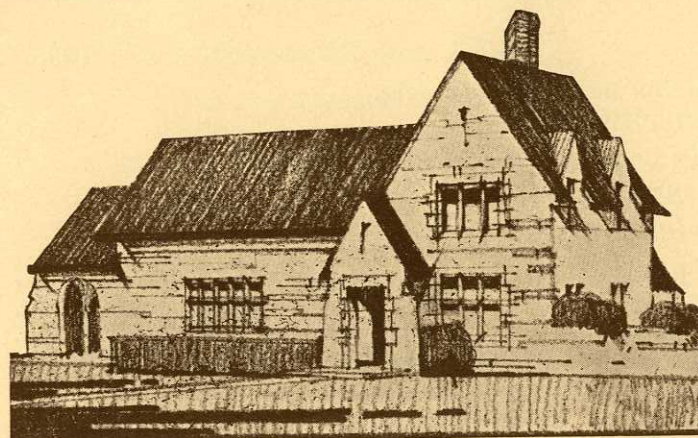
The Christian College can save the boy of the South from mediocrity and transform him into a leader of men. And leadership is what the world needs at this most critical period.

In this advice, Humboldt, the great Prussian statesman, was right.
