In Shelby County and nationwide, a central theme in the mass incarceration era is a widespread education deficiency. A growing convergence between education and incarceration has emerged, with incarceration being prioritized over education.

In this conversation, Dr. Cage will explore the interconnectedness of local and national practices related to education and incarceration and highlight the lived educational experiences of people adversely impacted by the education system and the carceral system.



Stephanie Cage is the associate director of The Lynne & Henry Turley Memphis Center at Rhodes College, where she also teaches in Urban Studies. Her current research centers on the educational experiences of incarcerated and formerly incarcerated people; in particular, her work examines the experiences of black males. Recently, her work has appeared in Boston University's *Impact Journal for the Center for Interdisciplinary Teaching & Learning*.
