The students of the S. P. U. have gotten in on the ground floor of this organization which is being recognized throughout the country, especially the South, as the foe of the H. C. L. We only regret that the ingenious one originating this novel scheme did not do so before so many purchased suits, ranging in price from \$80 to \$105. However, everyone is entering the club with great spirit and interest. Many rumors and dark wisps have been heard as a result of the propaganda in the newspapers, which some clothing dealers requested the papers to suppress. However, a bomb was thrown into our midst last Friday when Prof. L. I. MacQueen brought the subject before the students in chapel. "Ole Miss" Defeats S. P. U.

Visitors Win Game on Friday Afternoon by Score of 4 to 0—Saturday by 10 to 3.

Playing their thirteenth game on Friday seemed to give Ole Miss luck instead of putting a hoodoo on them. They had all the breaks and then some, and it must be said of them that they were not slow to take advantage of these, and in addition to this they played bang-up ball. The Red and Black lost and there can be no alibis, for which with the exception of misjudging a fly ball and two errors, one a wild throw and the other in fielding a ground ball, the team was in good form.

It was a good game, especially when one considers the condition of the field, and the score does not near indicate the number of times the Ole Miss twirler was in bad holes, only to pull out by wonderful fielding behind him or a break in luck, such as would seem impossible.

Most of the spectators and even members of the Ole Miss team say the score should have been 4 to 2. Joe Love was called out at the plate on a very close play, and Ted Patton was hit by the pitcher with the bases drunk, but somehow the umpire did not see it and he has the last say.

Both teams played good ball and stars would be hard to pick, but these few men were outstanding. For Ole Miss, McNeese pitched a good game; the fielding of Farmer was wonderful and P. Wilson almost knocked the cover off the ball. For S. P. U., Stringer pitched good ball; "Ooley" Wilson fielded and threw in big league style. Ted Patton played third in a way that made Clarksville fans think of John Holton and Joe Love kissed the old pill

as Ben Shaw used to. The other men played well and all would deserve mention if there was space.

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**DECLAMATION CONTEST
PRIZES AWARDED
Prizes in Oratory and Debate to
Be Awarded.**

At the chapel exercises on April 16, the prizes for the Declamation Contest were awarded. Dr. Diehl presented these in his usual charming manner with a most fitting eulogy of an orator. He said that the use of eloquent but selected words to change the attitude of people, to sway opinion and to create fervor in their hearts is the purpose of a real orator. Such an orator was the Italian poet De Annunzio. Because of the great value of a man standing before an assemblage expressing his ideas, many colleges have put in the course in public speaking. Much is gained, not by flowery words of power of chaste language with real ideas behind it. It is necessary for an orator to have something worth while to say, yet he must know the fundamental principles upon which a public address is based. Declamation is the first subject taken up in a public speaking course. This is the first time that prizes have been awarded in the Declamation classes. Prizes for oratory and debate will be awarded later in the spring.

Those who enjoyed the two evenings spent in the Declamation Contest will recall that Mr. R. B. Runyon was the winner in the Sophomore class of the prize of \$10; while Mr. C. E. Mount, was the winner in the Freshman class of a similar prize. We congratulate both of these young men and expect to hear from them in later contests.

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
