#### **Course Description**

This course is the introductory semester that teaches the fundamentals of the Ancient Greek language, specifically the Attic dialect. Although the primary goal of the elementary sequence of courses (Greek 101-102) is to prepare students to use Greek documents in a wide variety of academic contexts, students in this course will develop all four language skills: reading, writing, listening, and speaking.

#### **Course Objectives**

- To gain knowledge of the essential forms, grammar, syntax, and basic vocabulary of the Ancient Greek language.
- To gain the ability to read, speak, understand, and translate both adapted and un-adapted passages in Greek.
- To become acquainted with daily life and culture of the ancient Greeks and to recognize and understand the values and social attitudes of the ancient Greeks which are embedded in their language.

Students are expected to complete all assignments on time, and to spend quality time every day in reading and reviewing grammar, syntax, and vocabulary.
