**TO BE OR NOT TO BE A CHRISTIAN COLLEGE**

In his address to the incoming freshmen and transfer students, President Daughdrill quoted a Bible verse to my amazement and I am sure to the surprise of my fellow students. He proclaimed to the over-crowded sanctuary of Evergreen Pres. Church that "the fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge." As all good incoming students do, I read through the college's catalogue and some other paraphernalia that I had received from the college. As I combed through the 93-94 catalogue and Rhode's College Statement of Christian Commitment and Church Relationship, my eye was caught by statements like these;

"The College maintains a climate in which the Christian faith is nurtured",

"The College ensures that the Christian faith is clearly articulated",

-(Rhodes) creates a climate in which the Christian faith is reasonably and persuasively presented."

-(The College) is dedicated to a special witness to the Christian faith"

-(Rhodes) sees to it that a large majority of trustees, administrators, and faculty are Christians"

"The College is committed to higher education set in a Christian frame of reference."

From statements like these and other well polished sentences affirming "Christian ideals", one comes to the conclusion that Rhodes is an oasis of Christian learning among "the colleges of today that have a secular outlook." One particular point that is worth exploring is the claim that "a large



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majority of faculty, administrators, and trustees are Christians." In another statement Rhodes makes the disclaimer that "the College does not require intellectual adherence to creedal religion and that Rhodes does not exclude persons from its faculty, administration, or governing bodies who may hold other views." Now, it is impossible to hire "a large majority of Christians" and not exclude others who hold different views. The College, by its own mandate is under an obligation to hire "a large majority of Christians", thus forcing the College to discriminate on the basis of personal beliefs. Another statement that Rhodes makes that contradicts itself from the above quote is "The College's Christian commitment and church relationship is more than assent to a set of vague values or sentimental emotions." If Rhodes is so committed to more than just "vague values and sentimental emotions", then why won't Rhodes at least have their "large majority of Christians" believe the same view that the College

holds? Also, if Rhodes does not require "intellectual adherence to creedal religion" or some form of affirmation to certain Christian truths, how does the College know that they have hired a Christian? Doesn't one know whether a person belongs to a particular religion by what that individual adheres to and embraces as truth?

As for the other statements that the College claims are true, I will let you decide for yourself if the College is being honest or if it is lying. If the College is lying, then put down the Rat's Ass, get off YOUR Ass and report the Administration to the Honor Council.

Rhodes Security Council Unveils New Goal: No Faculty

Rhodes administration wigs are abuzz over the Security Council's new plan for the college. Taking to heart President Daughdrill's April 22 address (see *The Rat's Ass*, Volume 2, Number 1), the Council have stepped forward with a bold recommendation: get rid of all faculty by 2010. The recommendation follows the president's emphasis on more efficient use of school funds and the latest technology.

"You can see the president's subtext as clear as day," said one anonymous-by-request administration lackey. "It's time to ring out the old-fashioned, inefficient live-teacher classroom and ring in the cost-effective electronic classroom."

The Security Council's plan calls for the complete out-phasing of the human element in Rhodes classroom instruction by 2010. Amidst the international race to develop fiber optic technology, the Council see higher education heading faster and deeper into the farthest recesses of the microchip.

will have access to the sharpest minds at work in any given field. The experts will be able to deliver lectures to thousands of students at once, and they

will be available for consultation at any time, from any remote corner of our now-miniscule globe. Classroom teachers, obviously, are fast becoming obsolete."

As is to be expected, the new plan has drawn some criticism from current faculty. "We're a little uneasy about this," said one anonymous-by-request professor. "I mean, in fifteen years we'll all be pushing grocery carts around in the streets. We'll be hitting you up for money and then psychoanalyzing you on the basis of whether you do or do not cough it up. Nobody wants that."

"What's more," said another professor, "nobody has really speculated as to the effect on the students. What will result from a complete loss of personal contact between students and faculty? The Socratic dialogue will be reduced to spiritless molecules of phosphorus."

In an auxiliary decision, the Council amended the president's plan of adding ten

new students per year to fifty new students, bringing the projected totals for the year 2010 to approximately 2200 students, 0 faculty. As there has been no mention of additional computer purchases, the projected number of work stations is expected to hold steady at 200 or less.

P: Donuts just are, yeah, but

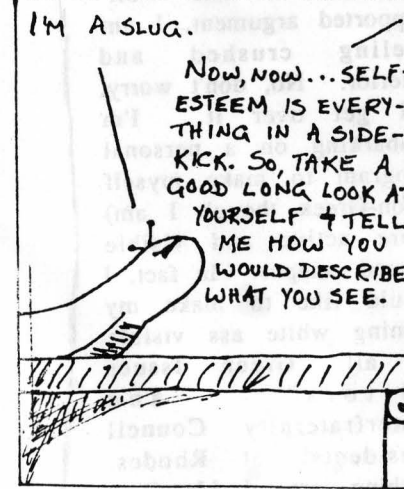

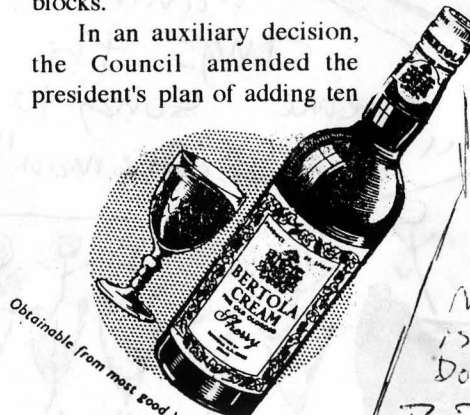
