### COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course will introduce students to some of the main themes of modern South Asian history. The emphasis will be on political developments, but some attention will be devoted to religious, social, economic and cultural matters. Major topics that will be covered include: decline of the Mughal empire and rise of regional powers; European imperialism and emergence of British rule; expansion and consolidation of British rule; 1857 mutiny-rebellion; origins and evolution of Indian nationalism; Hindu and Muslim revivals; Gandhi's rise to power; Muslim separatism; World War Two and Partition; Nehru's era; and post-colonial India and Pakistan.

### COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Students are required to attend lectures regularly and to participate fully in class discussions. They will be expected to read all assigned readings on time and to be prepared to discuss those readings during the designated class sessions. Class participation will be graded; those unable or unwilling to participate in class discussions may submit summaries of the assigned readings to compensate. Excessive absences will affect the final course grade. There will be two take-home essay examinations; each will be graded on the basis of style, clarity, and organization, as well as content. Essay examinations submitted after the deadline has passed will be automatically reduced by one letter grade. **There are no exceptions to this rule.** Students must also properly cite all sources used for the essay assignment, including websites such as Wikipedia. **The professor reserves the right to assign a failing grade for the assignment, or for the entire course, for any misuse of sources.**

Final grades will be determined as follows: class participation - 30%; mid-term examination - 30 %; final examination - 40%.

**Extra credit:** During the course of the semester students will have the opportunity to earn extra credit by attending approved events, such as lectures, movies, and restaurant meals. Extra credit will also be awarded for book reviews (maximum of two) and visiting appropriate off-campus sites, such as the India Cultural Center and Temple in Eads. The amount of extra credit will vary for each activity and will be announced in advance.
